THE COMING REVOLUTION

As an outcome of the present world upheaval, on all hands are to be heard discussions anent the revolution, which most people seem convinced is bound to come. According to the mental attitude of the different people, so is the future looked upon with dread, or gladness. As an expression of a very actual thing, possibly people have come to use the word "revolution" as a rather loose manner, according to each individual predilection. By confining revolution to mean "red ruin and the breaking up of laws" as it has already been defined, none will dispute its meaning in this sense. But there seems to be little reason for imagining that the condition of Russia at present will become popular in other countries, whose social progress has been more orderly. What is oftener meant by the revolution which is coming is the greater control of affairs by a higher educated proletariat.

The advent of a labor government does not necessarily mean revolution in the above defined sense, for if democracy be a reality, no government which is restricted to a class or to a limited number of classes can adequately represent the will of the people. While there is still a great deal of nonsense being talked about democracy, and in many instances there is an almost childish belief that parliament, as we have it, and even as it prevails in Great Britain, is really democratic, there is also a growing suspicion that the mass of the people have very little say, or share, in matters political, or even national. Our sense of honor will one day make us feel that we must do for our own country what we profess to be fighting to do for Serbia and Belgium. The importance of increased production during these times is being dinned into all ears, and this is being followed by the recognition that what is the more important still is a just distribution.

A true labor government will be one that recognizes this aim as being attainable. The unity

brought out by the war, and the stimulus given to the imaginative powers of the people by the seeing of what can be done when they will to do it, must be used for the furtherance of real social reform. The British Empire has said that it is fighting for the democratic ideal, but what the British peoples have to do is to digest what that ideal really is.

The ideal of what the State of the future is to really mean has got to be revised, and then the best men have to be got to work it, regardless of what "class" they come from. The best men for the jobs have got to be secured. Labor men must be used because they are some of the very best men in the country, not merely because they have worked with their hands. As one writer points out, "Nobody objects to Sir William Robertson because he was a ranker, nor to Lord Curzon on the score that he is a very superior person. On the other hand, it does not follow that the best person to put in the War Office is a soldier, or into the Education Office a professor, or into the Ministry of Munitions a laborer."

By getting the best men for the jobs of governing, a true aristocracy will be produced, which may end in producing a true democracy. The Labor government of the future has magnificent opportunities before it. The great changes now required are a more equitable distribution of wealth, the disappearance of idleness, and of useless luxury in all classes, and the closer association of employers and employed. Such reforms are attainable if there be understanding and goodwill on all sides. "Seek out wisdom," said the preacher, "but with all thy getting get understanding." With a real democratic government, it may be that remedies will be found for the patent evils from which the people have too long suffered. Revolution can only occur when the principles of democracy are flagrantly violated, as has happened in Russia, which is providing object lessons of

mendous import to all who have eyes to see. In all ages, revolutions have been made by small minorities, and the masses have been bribed or deceived into disorderly acquiescence. Wherever constitutional methods for the ascertaining of the will of the people exist, there can be no need and no justification for "the breaking up of laws," and the setting up of a murderous tyranny, which leads straight to national disaster.

PROVINCE OF KAZAN BECOMES A REPUBLIC

London, April 12.—Kazan province, in Eastern European Russia, has been proclaimed an independent republic by the Congress of Peasants in that province, according to Reuter's Petrograd correspondent. The Council of People's Commissaries has been notified to this effect.

Kazan Province is in the Volga region, and its capital, Kazan, is situated on the Kazan-Ka River near the point of its confluence with the Volga, 430 miles east of Moscow. The population of more than 2,000,000 is over one-half Russian and more than one-third Tartar. Its area is 24,600 square miles.

LAND REGISTRY ACT

(Sections 36 and 134.)
Re Application Nos. 9831-1, 9832-1, 9834-1.
TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Frank W. Hart, of Prince Rupert, B. C., as owner in fee under four Tax Sale Deeds from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 25th day of November, 1917, and one Tax Sale Deed dated 22nd day of September, 1916, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situated, lying and being in the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lots seven (7) and fifteen (15), Block twelve (12), Lot twelve (12), Block forty-eight (48), and Lots thirty-three (33) and thirty-four (34), Block fifty-one (51), all in Section Eight (8), Map 923. You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by publication in the Prince Rupert Daily News), and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:— "and in default of a caveat or certificate of his pendens being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, . . . and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be forever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."

AND WHEREAS on investigating the title it appears that prior to the 12th day of October, 1916 (the date on which the said lands were sold for overdue taxes), you were the registered and assessed owners as stated below.

FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that at the same time I shall effect registration in pursuance of such application and issue a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the said lands in the name of Frank W. 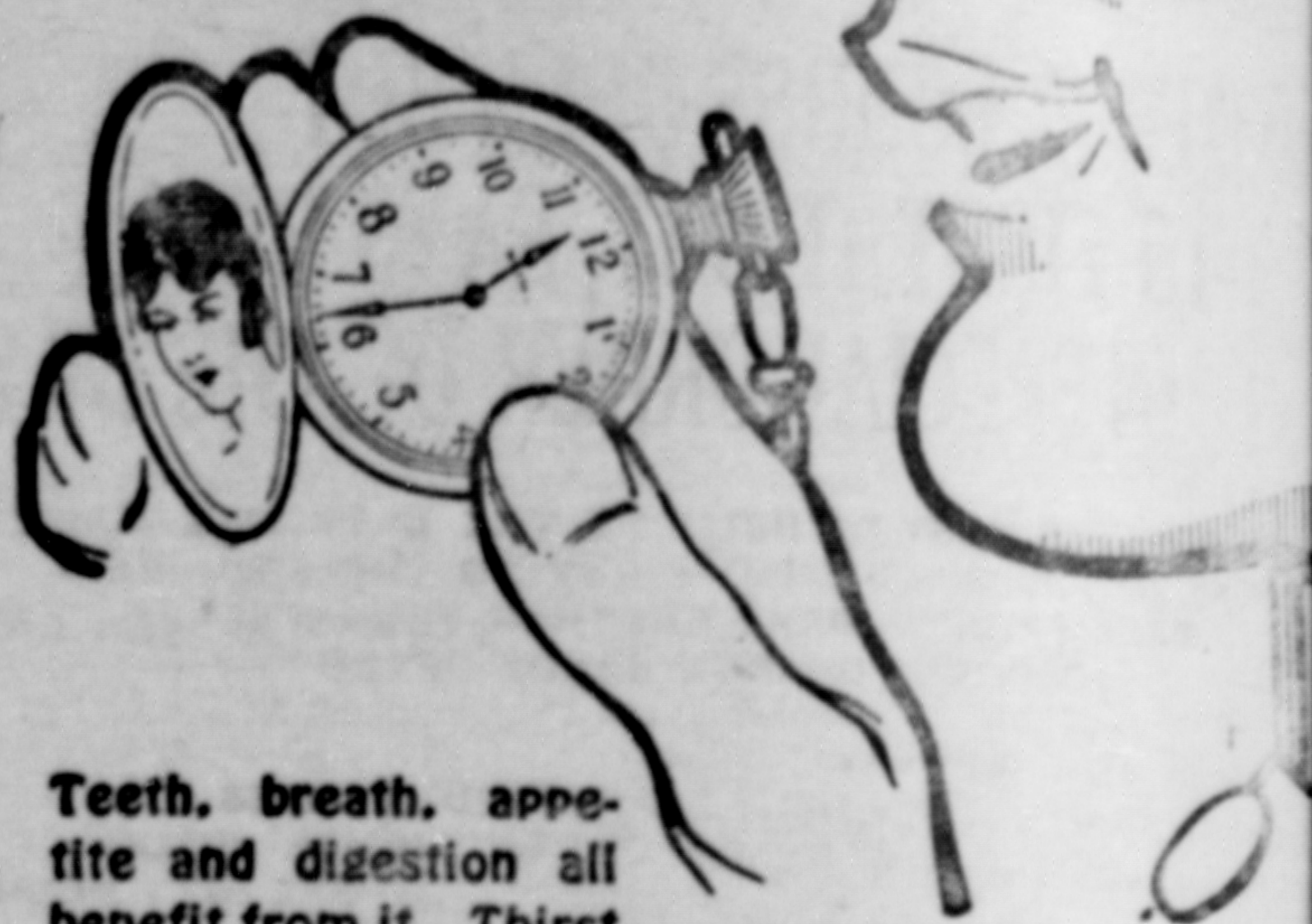
