Pte. Wm. Joy, one of the old timers, was among the arrivals back in town this morning.

The Prince Rupert was late in arriving in port today, not pulling into the wharf until nearly noon.

Captain and Mrs. Ward, who have been visiting here for the past few days, sailed for the south yesterday by the Princess Sophia.

The pupils of the High School are paying a visit to the Gold Storage this afternoon, where they will get an object lesson in the handling of fish.

Inspector J. E. Miller, of the Inland Revenue Department, sailed this morning by the Prince Rupert for Vancouver. The vessel did not pull out until noon.

Joseph Rangea, alias Williams, the colored gentleman found in possession of marked cards, was committed for trial this morning by Magistrate Carss at the police court.

Mr. H. McCall, general superintendent of the G. T. P., and Mr. Beaumont, of the G. T. P. Steamship Company, returned to town this morning after a visit to Vancouver.

Captain H. A. Pearson, who has been in this district for the last week in the interests of the Y. M. C. A. Red Triangle Fund, sailed for Vancouver yesterday afternoon. Mr. Wm. Boulton, who accompanied him here, is remaining in town for a few days longer.

The charge against D. Zarelli of keeping a gaming house, and against fourteen men with being inmates thereof was dismissed by Magistrate Carss this morning. The evidence led was not sufficient to prove that the establishment was being conducted as a gaming house, within the meaning of the act. While the games were being played in the club, there was nothing to show that the house received a "rakeoff."

THERE WAS BUT ONE LOVELACE

"Stone walls do not a prison make,
Nor iron bars a cage."

Who has not read these words at some time or another. So well known are they that with some of the proverbs of Solomon, these sentences, as sentences, have become part of our language. Again "I could not love thee, dear so much, Loved I not honor more." The same may be said regarding this couplet. With them is suggested at once the name of the author, Richard Lovelace. The present year is the tercentenary of the poet's birth and it is with these two couplets that he has won immortality. On some unknown day of the year 1618 occurred the birth of Richard Lovelace. Few things he has written, except the poems from which these lines are taken have found a place in the general knowledge of his countrymen, but they themselves are among the words about which it may be said not only that the world will not willingly forget them, but also that the world has actually remembered them. They have long ago passed into familiar language, and they live in the universal memory, and with them the record of the short life of a cavalier of the civil war.

Lovelace was a Loyalist politician. His fortunes fluctuated with those of his royal master. On more than one occasion, he was enabled to judge the prisonlike walls and iron bars. He died in poverty and misery at the age of forty after a strenuous and chequered career, a victim of the troubles of the time.

It has been said that "on a surer foundation than the permanence of his poetry rests the chivalrous repute in which his life has been held," but this may be an extreme view. Most people will care about his chivalrous repute, and are interested in the handsome youth, who sacrificed everything for his cause, because he has given to us some of the best known lines in the language. There were many noble and unfortunate youths, on both sides in the civil war, but there was only one Lovelace.—G. H.

Grow Your Own Vegetables

CITY people this year must help to grow their own food. Every pound of vegetables that can be produced in home gardens or vacant lots will be a positive addition to the supply of food. Moreover the cultivation of land in city, town and village will leave market gardeners and farmers free to grow wheat and other supplies for export.

It may be that the only contribution which you can make towards relieving the dire food needs of our Allies will be a vegetable garden. If 200,000 families in Canada would cultivate a garden of this kind it would mean a very important aggregate addition to our food supply.

In Montreal vegetables to the value of \$100,000 were grown on vacant lots last year. Calgary had over 1,100 lots under cultivation, covering an area of 200 acres. Splendid results were achieved in other cities.

There is even greater necessity for war gardens this year. Tremendous interest in the movement is reported from all parts of the Dominion. Are you a member of a vacant lot organization? If none exists in your community help to organize one.

Home garden and vacant lot cultivation is really needed and may truly be considered a patriotic service.

Organized Efforts Will Bring Best Results

Decide here and now to have a war garden. Persuade your neighbours to do the same. All the tools necessary are a spade, rake and hoe. The cost of seeds is a trifle. Grow only standard vegetables such as potatoes, beans, peas, beets, carrots, parsnips, onions and lettuce.

By growing your own vegetables you can not only perform a patriotic duty, you can also help to control the high cost of living.
