A TRANSPARENT GAME

In trying to manipulate the sentiment of the returned soldiers to their political advantage, Messrs. Bowser, Ross & Co., are overlooking one or two rather important circumstances. In the first place, they forget that the men back from overseas are not unsophisticated strangers who never heard of Messrs Bowser and Ross before, and who therefore will fall enthusiastically behind them and vote as they dictate in the next provincial election. The returned soldiers know all about that amiable pair. Both were in office when many of them left for overseas, and both were too busy greasing their political machine to do a solitary thing for returned soldiers; syndicates were corralling tho provincial land under the indulgent eye of Mr. Ross, while the importunities of the P.
