The Princess Sophia arrived from the south this morning about 11:30 on her way to Alaskan points.

The Princess Royal arrived early this morning, and after taking on a lot of fish, sailed for Vancouver at 9 a. m.

Mr. James Smith, of Digby Island, who has been sick for the past several days, is now well on the way to recovery.

Mr. W. G. Norrie-Lowenthal, superintendent of the Silver Standard Mine, near Hazelton, returned up river this morning.

Mr. T. A. Kelley, of Atli Inlet, who is conducting extensive logging operations on the Islands, was among the arrivals in the city yesterday.

Mrs. Wm. Rothwell, mother of Mrs. F. G. Dawson, left by this morning's train for her home in Regina, after spending the winter on the coast.

Mr. J. T. C. Williams, fisheries inspector for this district, has been sick for the past several weeks, and the date of his arrival here is uncertain.

One of the large G. T. P. barges arrived in port yesterday carrying a quantity of creosoted piling for the construction of the addition to the Grand Trunk wharf. It also had coal for Albert & McCaffery.

Mr. and Mrs. Gulich were among the departures for Vancouver this morning by the Princess Royal. Mr. Gulich, who was the local agent of Swift and Co., has been transferred to another district.

The work in connection with the construction of the new cannery at Port Edward is now well under way. The driving of the piles is now practically completed and the operations are progressing smoothly.

The Prince Albert is now on her way to Queen Charlotte Island ports from Vancouver, and as part of her cargo for the Islands, has on board some fifteen donkey engines for use in the logging operations there.

The Church Parade of the Odd-Fellows took place last evening. Gathering at the K. P. Hall, they marched to the Anglican Church, where an appropriate sermon was preached by the Rev. Canon Rix. There was special music.

The welcome sight of a passenger train was again seen this morning pulling out for the east at 11 o'clock. The good progress made in the clearing of the tracks after the numerous slides justified its despatch today. It is expected that the first of the stalled trains may get into town this afternoon sometime.

Interest the boys and girls in the War Garden, for they too can help to grow food.
