NEUTRALS

With Germany as a neighbor, the position of the small neutral countries of Holland and Switzerland can hardly be said to have been comfortable since the beginning of the war, nearly four years since. With the terrible example of Belgium held before their eyes, as a result of the application of German kultur, the possibility of the same thing happening to them has made them go very carefully. With their respective armies mobilized for the last four years, for eventualities, this drain upon the resources of these small countries has been considerable. Soldiers in the ranks are not producers, even if they be not fighting.

The truculence of the German tone in its communications to Holland recently, demanding that she break her neutrality, is significant of the fact that Germany has still as little consideration for her neighbors as ever. Between these two little countries, they have nearly a million men under arms; fresh troops and highly trained, and upon whom the lessons of warfare of the last four years have not been thrown away. Upon either flank of the present German line, they would constitute a grave menace to the most thickly populated portion of Germany, did they join in with the Allies.

It is not out of the question to consider that Germany herself may bring these little countries into the conflict by her own actions. By swift action, she might hope to render Holland helpless before the Allies could render her assistance sufficient to keep her frontiers secure. And precipitate action on the part of Ger-

many might mean enough to cause the war to end somewhat sooner than she might expect. The possibilities before a strong Allied force co-operating with the Dutch armies in an invasion of German territory to the south of Holland are immense, which in itself, may be sufficient to regard the German threats to Holland as so much bluff.
