FOOD AND TREASON

Food Controller Thompson says it is little short of treason to ignore the object and spirit of the food regulations.

By what judgment he judges the Food Controller must expect to be judged.

If it is little short of treason to ignore the object and spirit of the food regulations, how much less "short of treason" is it to frame food regulations which subvert the "object" of saving food to the "spirit" of private greed?

If it is near treason to eat wheat, beef and pork instead of substitute foods, how much is it less akin to treason for a food controller to allow profiteers to boost the prices of substitute foods to such heights that the public are discouraged, or even prevented, from eating them?

If it is something resembling treason to waste a scrap of meat in the kitchen or at the table, how much less does it resemble treason to allow cold storage companies to destroy car loads of meat by avoidable "accidents" and send it to the incinerator?

The food control department has been administered consistently on the assumption that the Canadian people are wealthy enough to eat what they please and wasteful enough to throw away what they ought to eat.

That assumption runs counter to the facts that food prices have reached such an altitude that people in Canada have to eat the kinds of food which give them most nutritive value for the money; and that admonitions against waste of food fit to eat are no longer needed by anyone with sense enough to understand them.

Canada's Food Controller seems to be the only man in Canada who cannot understand that the relative prices of foods has more to do with determining what and how much people shall eat than all the regulation of the food control department since it began its doubtful career of meddling and

monkeying with the use and prices of foodstuffs.

It may be that the object of the Food Controller is to save food. If so it is his misfortune to have obscured that object under regulations which seem curiously and consistently devised to enable the enterprising middleman somewhere along the line to plunder the public in the name of patriotism.

If the Food Controller would tackle the problem of controlling food prices as resolutely as the Canadian people have had to tackle the problem of keeping down the family food cost, he would convince the public of his sincerity; and find better use for his time than hurling threats of treason charges at people who are denying themselves without regard to his regulations.

The people of Canada are willing to go hungry that their allies may be fed. But they recognize no obligation, and no profit to the Allied cause, in enduring the pangs of an "aching void" that the Flavelle fraternity may charge the people of England hold-up prices for the food thus saved from consumption.

Before the Food Controller throws accusations of treason at the public if they fail to observe his regulations he should dissociate those regulations from the suspicion that they are drawn in the interests of the profiteers, and conduct his department in a way to show that it is an agency for the public good and not simply a "runner up" for the food exploiter.—Edmonton Bulletin.

London, May 20.—German aviation has proved a signal failure in the great offensive on the western front, according to an officer correspondent of the Morning Post. Writing from the front, he says:

"German aviation does not exist at present. There are two principal reasons, the first being the tremendous wastage caused by the incessant attacks of the British and French pilots on Ger-

man machines, the second being the bombing of airdromes. The enemy today suffers from lack both of men and machines in its flying army.

"In every department the Germans have been and still are exerting their full strength. If they had airplanes available there is no doubt that they would have made full use of them, as we have done, for observation purposes to prevent the bringing up of reinforcements and to disorganize troops on the actual field of battle. They have done none of these things effectively.

"The conclusion seems manifest that it is because they have not the necessary force available. In any case the fact remains that German aviation has ceased to be a force to be seriously reckoned with. In the last four weeks the situation, which on several occasions has necessarily been delicate, would have been very much more so, had the Germans been equipped with an adequate air service to supply them with definite observation."
