CERTIFICATE OF IMPROVEMENTS.**

encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, which was held at St. Louis that year. The day before I left New York, an editorial appeared strongly supporting President Cleveland for a second term, being one of the first leading newspapers to take this step. Joseph Pulitzer was then owning and pushing to the front the New York World as a Democratic organ and the next day it followed the Herald's lead, and also came out for a second term. The World editorial was cabled to Mr. Bennett and the next day the Herald totally reversed its editorial policy as to Cleveland.

I was to accompany Cleveland for the Herald on his swing around the circuit from St. Louis, and when in St. Louis I read the second editorial in the Herald, which delicately hinted at Cleveland's adipose and addle-pated characteristics, I was in doubt whether I was there to praise or to bury the presidential Caesar, until Mr. Bennett was again heard from on the subject.

Mr. Bennett lived in Paris on the Champs Elysees, but had also a beautiful chateau some forty miles outside Paris, to which he was fond of inviting gay young chaps to "Come to luncheon and put on the gloves with me." While in Paris, I received a letter from a certain colonel of the Pacific coast who requested me to sound Mr. Bennett as to sending him to Egypt as war correspondent. About three o'clock the next morning I met Mr. Bennett at the Jockey Club, and ventured to ask when I might call upon him on business. "Come to petit déjeuner at half past nine," was his reply. I did so, and found Mr. Bennett going over a pile of Heralds of which each article and paragraph was marked with the name of the writer in red, and the name of the editor who had passed it for publication in blue. But before this, Mr. Bennett had taken a ten-mile gallop in the Bois de Boulogne, which was his invariable custom while in Paris or at his country place.

His was a full round life to the end. Full of the refined gaieties of existence that fall only to the wealthy; full of the worries and exciting perplexities and sheer hard mental work of one whose soul is happily centred on a worthy ambition, and with the exception of the last two years of recurrent illness, he rounded his long life as few are able to do, replete with honored achievement.

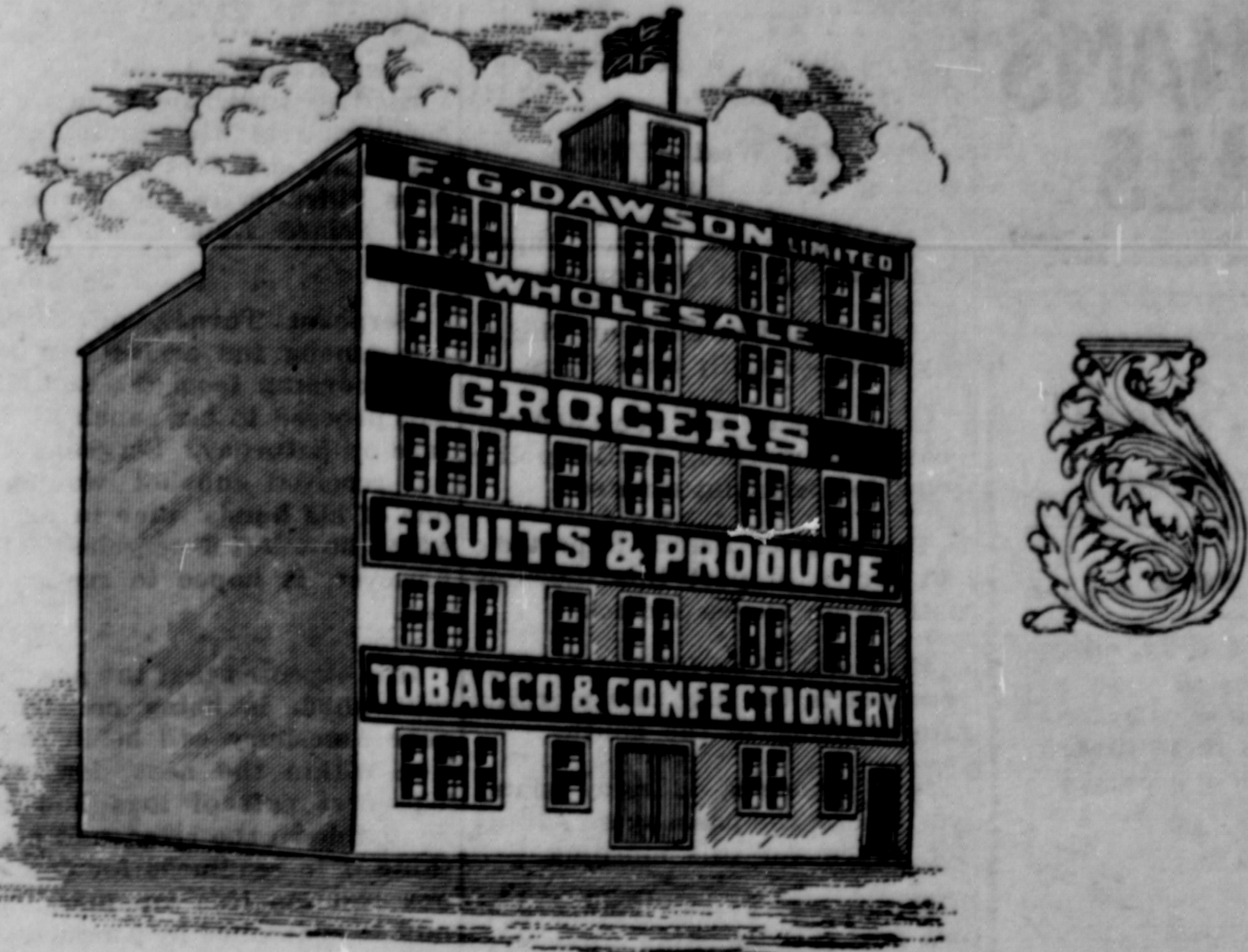
