

THE OFFENSIVE

After exactly two months' rest, the German troops are again being thrown into the fight, in the vain endeavor of the German High Command to make way to the Channel ports. It has taken the German staff these nine weeks to get their battalions refitted after the gruelling they received during their previous advance, and from the accounts which have come through already of the first day's fighting, their losses are going to be as heavy this time as before.

In the Aisne region, the allied troops, British and French have given ground before the weight of the enemy advance, pursuing the same tactics that were so disastrous to the German armies in the month of March. Fighting every inch of the way, the Allies have taken. a terrible toll of the enemy formations in their forward movement The joint action of the British and French troops in the retiral from the front line positions on the Aisne is described as "magnificent cooperation." Thus the German plan of separating the two armies at the point of juncture has been foiled. Where mere territory is not of extreme importance, the allies have permitted the enemy to move forward-at their price. But in Flanders, where there is little space to give, without entailing serious results, the enemy can make no progress. What gains he did make at Voormezeele in his initial rush have been recaptured by the French counter-attack. The Germans find themselves up against a stone wall, so far as Flanders is concerned. At Verdun the French general said "They shall not pass," and they did not, and the same watchword is the one applicable to the allied line from Lens north. These coveted ports on the English Channel must be denied

and Vacant Lot cultivation will leave the farmers free to grow more food for export.


The vegetable garden offers an opportunity for service to men whose circumstances make it impossible for them to work on a farm, to women, to boys and girlsto city people generally.
