United States World Flyers Are Feared to Have Come to Grief

MOSCOW, July 8:-Grave apprehension was felt as to the safety of James Mattern and Bennett Griffin last night as the two former United States army flyers became twenty-four hours overdue on a flight from Berlin to Moscow in the course of their attempt to break the record of Wiley Post and Harold Gatty for a flight around the world.

Russian flyers were being mobilized to search for the missing aviators along the Polish frontier and also in the direction of Siberia in the belief that the Americans might have attempted to reach Omsk without stopping

Mattern and Griffin took only light provisions with them on leaving Berlin on Wednesday. Much of the territory over which they were to fly is barren wilder-
