**THE OLD AND THE NEW**

The reading of a typically Bowserian utterance in the election campaign now come to a close in Victoria upon the shortcomings of the present Liberal Government suggests to the Victoria Times the query "what would William John do if he were back again, back from exile, so to speak? The answer is easy. Like the Bourbons, he would resume where he left off when he felt the impact of the electorate's boot. "Mr. Bowser probably would turn the P. G. E. over to the original promoters and borrow more millions for them at ruinous rates of interest. He would get into immediate communication with Sir William and Sir Donald and tell them the coast was clear, that John Oliver was out of the way and they could resume their picnic at the expense of the B. C. public.

"The banner emblazoned with the motto, 'The speculator must have his chance,' would be unfurled and all the resources that were still intact would become the happy hunting ground of the old-time syndicates at present in eclipse. Mr. Bowser would resume his legal associations with the P. G. E., the Canadian Northern Pacific and countless other companies seeking favors from Mr. Bowser as Premier—with all of 'em except the Dominion Trust which blew up under Mr. Bowser's very nose, ruining scores of people whom Mr. Bowser, as chief law officer of the Province, never tried to protect.

"Considering his record Mr. Bowser is very lucky that the official Opposition in this province is complaisant enough to retain him as leader. And we doubt very much if John would have him anywhere else. The Premier is making good progress in clearing away the mess left by Mr. Bowser; he has disposed of the G. P. E. problem and is strenuously endeavoring to improve the Canadian Northern situation to the advantage of the province.

"Every step Mr. Oliver makes in that direction brings him into favorable contrast with the Leader of the Opposition, who never opens his mouth without conjuring up unpleasant memories in the public mind. Putting the situation

**RUSSIA'S RESOURCES OF RAW MATERIAL AT GERMANY'S DISPOSAL**

**But London Embassy Says Concessions to Germany will be Repudiated After the Bolsheviks Go.**

London, June 25.—The Bolsheviks are about to conclude a commercial pact with Germany which will subject Russia to further exploitation, it is indicated in an undated despatch from Moscow. At a meeting of the Russo-German Economic Commission, the despatch said, M. Bronsky, the Bolshevik commissioner of commerce and industry, declared that for the purpose of meeting Russia's debts to Germany, the Soviets were compelled to conclude a foreign loan. The interest, he said, would be paid in raw materials.

As a guarantee, Bronsky declared, Germany will be granted numerous concessions affecting the natural resources of Russia. Any concessions, commercial or otherwise, given to Germany by the Bolshevik government in return for German loans and other economic aid will be promptly repudiated when the present government is overthrown. Russian embassy officials declare.

This assurance was given following reports from Moscow that the Bolshevik government had turned over for German development many of the richest Russian natural resources as surety on a German loan.

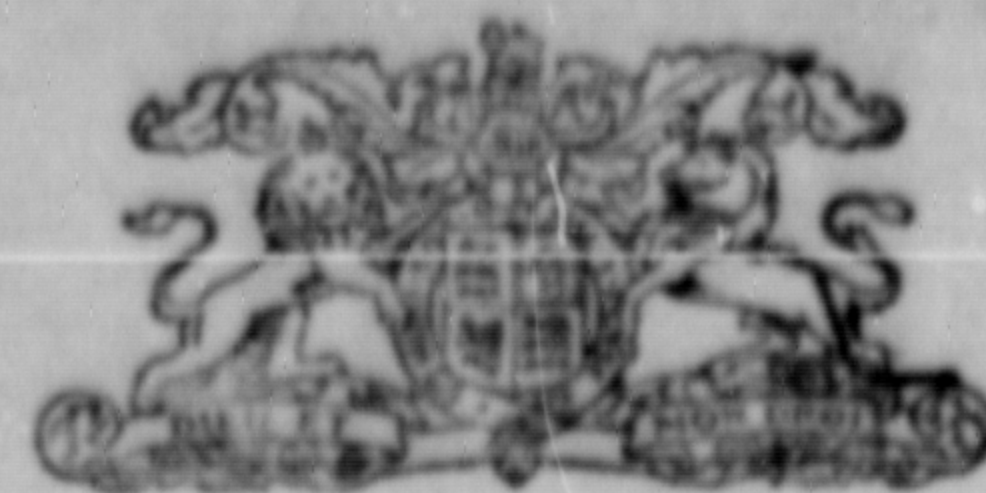

**Men 19 and 20 Years of Age.**  
**Harvest Leave.**

**Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship.**  
**Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence.**

**Men Nineteen and Twenty Years of Age.**

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a widespread impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since October 13, 1917, as well as those who may become nineteen from time to time and who have been or will be called upon to register under the Military Service Act, are to be immediately called to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to report for duty, nor has the question been brought before the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farms, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harvest is over, although of course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation incumbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

**Harvest Leave.**

Some enquiries have been received as to the possibility of granting harvest leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this point as advantage must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

**Leave of Absence on Grounds of Extreme Hardship.**

It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be widely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases:— (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the fact that the man concerned is either the only son capable of earning a livelihood, of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or under treatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more brothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or brothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being presently in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted, in determining the fact that the man is the "only" remaining son or brother; (b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship, loss or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

**Procedure to obtain leave of absence.**

A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of application have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned should on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.
