Prairie Man Hunt Ended With Suicide of Man Who is Said to Have Killed Mounted Police

KELVINGTON, Sask., July 9:- Exhausted, wounded and hunted by a relentless posse of forty armed policemen and three hundred militant farmers, William Miller, alleged robber and murderer, took his own life yesterday. Two companions, Mike and William Kuruluk, had already been taken by the police and both in confessions said that Miller was the man who fired the shots which killed Corporal Leonard Ralls of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Foam Lake Tuesday morning.

The finding of Miller's body in a patch of scrub timber brought to an end the greatest man hunt ever spread over Central Saskatchewan.
