PEACE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Present-day dreams of diplomats and statesmen for the formation of a post-bellum League of Nations to preserve a permanent peace have interesting historical precedent in the Old World. Henry IV.—the Henry of Navarre—in collaboration with Sully, the far-sighted statesman of his time, elaborated, as told in the latter's Memoirs, "the precise tactics and constitution of a League of European Nations to the final point when the knife of Ravallac destroyed a great man and a greater hope at a blow." As now the necessary thing to the accomplishment of the great purpose is a humbled, repentant, and regenerated Germany, so then the obstacle was Russia, and it is recorded that if Russia refused to enter the association she was "to be stripped of her European dominions and confined to Asia."

Other men before Henry had dreamed of a universal peace, and Erasmus, in the "Complaint of Peace" a century before, had tried to enlist the predatory potentates of Europe in a general scheme of disarmament and reconciliation. But Henry it was who, with Sully, attempted in practical constitutional form to show "that Europe might be regulated and governed as one great family." The end sought was, in Sully's own words, "to save the European powers from the maintenance of so many thousand soldiers, so many fortified places, and so many military expenses; to free them forever from the fear of those bloody catastrophes so common in Europe; to procure them an uninterrupted repose; and, finally, to unite them all in an indissoluble bond of security and friendship, after which they might live together like brethren." "For peace," wrote Sully, "is the great and common interest of Europe . . . What is the consequence of that profound policy of which she is so vain other than her own continual laceration and ruin? . . . Why must we always impose on ourselves the necessity of passing through war to arrive at peace, the attainment of which is the end of all wars and a plain proof that recourse is had to war only for want of a better expedi-

ent?" "Nevertheless, we have so effectually confounded this truth that we seem to make peace only that we may again be able to make war."

When Henry of Navarre dreamed and planned for, is still engaging the thoughtful attention of the statesmen of the Allied nations on a larger and more enduring scale. The League of Nations which President Wilson, Viscount Grey, ex-President Taft, and other leaders of civilized thought are advocating is a world league. But its purpose, like that of Henry centuries ago, is to procure for the nations of the earth "uninterrupted repose" and "to unite them all in an indissoluble bond of security and friendship." When Hohenzollernism and Prussianism is crushed, when the House of Hapsburg is crushed and the domination of the Unspeakeable Turk fall, this noble dream may become a reality.—Globe.

A TOUGH BITE

The latest information coming out from troublous Russia these days show that the heavy hand of the German cannot altogether keep down the turbulent in that country. The Bolshevik friends of Germany there are not having it all their own way, by any means, and the Revolutionary Socialists seem to be giving them all they can do to maintain themselves at all. The state of disunion which pervaded all Russia after the revolution gave Germany an opportunity which she was not slow to seize, in getting a grip of the country of her erstwhile enemy. While the leaders of the Bolsheviks may choose to consider the German as their friend, there are others in Russia who do not think so. And it is just possible that the events which are sure to arise from the assassination of the German ambassador may give that unity to the people of Russia which of necessity must precede their successful expulsion of the invader.

It has been said that the Russian has no particular love for the German, even before the war. Yet Russia was one of Germany's best customers, from a trade standpoint. Russia constituted a field in which Germany was able to exploit to her heart's content.

Yet the Russians did not like the Germans. They had to trade with them, for merchants of other countries did not give the facilities for business which the Germans did. And nowadays, the ordinary people of Russia have little reason to like the German any better than they did in pre-war days. Germany may find that her attempt to swallow Russia wholesale may be the cause of acute indigestion. In fact it would seem as if she had really bitten off more than she can chew right at the present moment.

When a semblance of order is evolved out of the present Russian chaos, which, after all, it is only a matter of time, for when the disease has spent itself, the patient recovers, the menace of German occupation will be removed. Russia in the past has given evidence of her capacity in dealing with invaders of her territory. They become Russianized, generally sooner or later, either dead or alive.
