It is also true that a great many people still find it hard to believe that there is any real change in the general outlook of the people and that very soon, when conditions begin to improve, we shall forget all those things. There will be many changes in the near future, changes made in Canada according to British methods, still carrying out British ideals, but many of the changes will be radical and almost revolutionary. The demand for greater equality of opportunity is becoming more intense as living conditions become harder.

It is becoming recognized that the spread between the very rich and the very poor is much too great and that steps will have to be taken, and that right soon, to have this spread lessened.

### DISTRIBUTION AT FAULT

The system of distribution seems to be at fault. During the past three years there has been too much food in the country with the result that the producer has not been able to receive enough for his product to enable him to live decently. On the other hand there have been thousands of people who have been unable to secure sufficient food and what they did receive has been largely as a largesse ball game, scheduled for Saturday which put them under obligation. We hear much talk about a business government. What we want is a government that will depart somewhat from the old fashioned business methods and deal with modern problems in a modern way.
