SHORTAGE OF ICE DRIVING BUSINESS AWAY FROM CITY

Continued From Page One.

The difficulty was that there was not enough to go round. In the course of discussion it was stated that Prince Rupert was the biggest halibut market on the coast and that in spite of the shortage it would make a good showing this year. The shortage of ice was driving business away. Mr. Cash told of one fisherman who had purchased an ice breaker and intended to pick up his own ice, either from the bergs or from the glacier.

Small Boats.

Mr. Megher said it was impossible for the smaller boats to go as far as the glacier for ice. He thought it was not a fair deal for the ice to be cut off from the boats. If they could not get ice here they would go to Seattle, as many of them did not like cutting their own ice.

It was suggested that the trawler Carruthers should tie up for a time and give the other boats a chance, but it was explained that the Canada Food Board was more anxious to get the cheap fish than the more expensive halibut.

After nearly two hours of discussion Superintendent McCall suggested that they should meet in his office in the morning and he would then be in a position to state exactly how much ice the company had, and perhaps they would be able to get the waiting fleet away for one more trip. The gathering then adjourned.

The most important lines on the markets this week are soft fruits, which have been coming in in large quantities. Strawberries are holding firm at \$3.75 per crate, with supplies dwindling. There are still plenty of berries in the fields, but the scarcity of pickers is rendering continued supplies precarious. Peaches, apricots, plums, and pears are so far scarce, but large shipments are expected to arrive over the weekend. Lieut. Alex. Young is expected to be on his way home by this time. He cabled on July 27 that he was leaving immediately, but no further word has since been received.

Chief Minty of the Provincial police, leaves tomorrow on a tour of inspection to Granby and Alice Arm. When at the latter place, he will swear in the newly appointed constable, H. H. Carney, there.

Wm. Balagno has received his violin back after having had to send it east for overhaul. He found that the damp atmosphere here on the coast was causing parts of the wood and the varnish to crack. It is now fixed up in good shape, and the tone is as good as ever.

William Thomas, a fisherman, was fined \$50.50 in the police court this morning for a breach of the Prohibition Act. He was rounded up last evening, slightly under the weather, and two soda water bottles were found in his possession. The bottles appeared to contain soda all right, according to the color of the liquid, but the contents were discovered to be gin. "Don't know how I got it," said the accused this morning to the magistrate.

A new departure this year in the salmon fishing industry is the arrival on the Skeena of large quantities of Alaskan salmon for canning. The American boats are bringing in large quantities, and disposing of them at the various canneries. The fixed price set by the U. S. Government is said to be the cause of this, as the canneries on the Skeena pay a better price, even with import duty. Added to the large run on the river this season every one of the canneries ought to have a record pack, if they can get enough cans.
