CHARLIE CHAPLIN HERE IN "A DOG'S LIFE"

The Divine Charlie is here again. Today he is to be seen in "A Dog's Life," positively the finest bit of funny stuff he has done yet. Charlie is always funny but this time he has fairly outdone himself. In Vancouver and Victoria recently this film had a big run, crowds going to see it at every performance. It is a three-reel run and is a side-splitter throughout the time.

Along with Chaplin is a film that has attracted a great deal of attention. It is Sir Gilbert Parker's "The World for Sale." It is a story that breathes the very



essence of the out-of-doors and the charm of gypsy lore, together with a love story of unusual interest. The scenes are laid in Canada and deal with the feud between two small townships, one a French-Canadian, the other strongly English, as well as with the adventures of Max Ingolby, who is one of the three men in love with charming Freda Druse, the heroine. How he wins out although handicapped by the temporary loss of his eyesite and the deep hatred of his two rivals, makes a thrilling photoplay which will linger in the memory as a fragrant wholesome breeze from Romany itself.

NEW PULP MILL

The first pulp mill is to be erected in Alaska at Funter Bay. The mill will have a capacity of twenty tons of pulp daily, while the sawmill will be installed in four units of 25,000 capacity each. Thomas Latimer is to have charge of the installation. Part of the work of the new mill will be to provide aeroplane spruce for war work. It is expected to have it in operation this fall.
