F. G. Doherty, who recently resigned from the local branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, is expected to leave for Winnipeg on Monday.

For the second day running, the police magistrate had a clean sheet this morning. The conduct of the citizens of Prince Rupert remains most exemplary.

J. Munn, of the Borden Milk Co., is spending a day or two in the city. Mr. Munn will leave for Anyox this evening, accompanied by Jack Venables, of the G. W. Nickerson Co., who are the firm's local agents.

The Unity is in this morning with 5,000 lbs. of halibut; Tom and Al., 67,000; Livingstone, 19,000; Nidaros, 9,000; Lansing, 8,000; Fairbanks, 6,000, and the Volunteer with 1,500 lbs. No sales were made up till noon.

The Board of Works committee of the City Council met last evening, when the deputation of property holders on the hill were also present. The pros and con of the reconstruction of the stairway leading from Fulton Street to Fourth Avenue were again discussed, but no definite conclusion was reached. They are going to Juneau and other Alaskan cities in the interests of the Chautauqua Festival to be held in these places. They will return to Prince Rupert on their way south and will assist the local committee in the arrangements for the Chautauqua Festival to be held here.

**CONSOLIDATION OF WHALING INTERESTS**

Consolidation of the principal whaling interests on the Pacific coast has resulted in the incorporation of the Consolidated Whaling Company Limited, with a capital of \$2,500,000. The head office of the company will be at Toronto with the head operating office at Victoria, S. C. Ruck, general manager.

The new company has taken over the Victoria Whaling Company with whaling plants at Kyuquot, Rose Harbor and Naden Harbor, owning eight steam whalers and a whaling tender and a large whale meat cannery at Kyuquot the American Pacific Whaling Company, with a station at Bay City, Washington, owning four steam whalers; and the North Pacific Sea Products Company, which has a station at Akutan, Aleutian Islands, owning three steam whalers, and the steamer Elihu Thomson, 1000 tons, and the auxiliary powered schooner Halcyon. The latter is engaged in halibut and cod fishing.

**P. G. E. CONTRACT**

Cotton Brothers of Vancouver have secured the contract for the construction of the 42 miles of the P. G. E. from Clinton to Williams' Lake. Their bid was \$308,000. There was one lower bid, that of McKinnon, Cooper, Drabble & Co. of Vancouver, but in consultation with the chief engineer of the road the Government has decided not to award the contract to that firm. Their bid was \$300,000. Palmer Bros. of Vancouver came third with a tender of \$349,000.
