POPULATION OF PRINCE RUPERT APPROXIMATELY FIVE THOUSAND PEOPLE

OFFICIAL RETURNS MADE BY REGISTRAR NELSON SHOWS THAT SKEENA DISTRICT HAS 20,670 PEOPLE OVER THE AGE OF SIXTEEN

The registrations figures have now been compiled by O. H. In addition to this there were a number of fishermen on United States owned fishing boats who were American subjects and were not required to register. In some instances these registered as a matter of precaution to avoid possible confusion if they wished to do business here, but in many cases it is safe to say that they

while Ketchikan or Seattle or some other American port may be regarded by them as their home are to the same extent as the many other fishermen who take this as their home, entitled to be classified with the Prince Rupert population. For nine or twelve months in the year they make this their port for landing fish and are at home here just the same as any local fisherman. This would make a decided increase in the population here.

Canneries Belong Here.

There is another aspect of the population that may be taken into account. In the enumeration of registrants in Prince Rupert, all the canneries with the exception of the Prince Rupert one are omitted. The canneries of the Skeena are very closely identified with the life of Prince Rupert. This is the point where the banking in this connection is done and considerable of the trading is out of here. More and more this is becoming the case and it is held by bonding houses that the population of these canneries might fairly be classified with Prince
