NUMEROUS PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS AT TOWN OF TERRACE

Telephone System Keeps Residents in Touch With Each Other—Many Varieties of Berries Grown.

Someone asks what they have in the way of public institutions at Terrace. They have three churches—Anglican, Catholic and Presbyterian. The first and last of these have resident ministers in charge. There is a public school with about thirty pupils, a Farmers' Institute, with Arthur Carr as president, a hotel, three general stores and a hardware establishment, a public hall for entertainments and what is more important perhaps than any there is a lumber mill.

The mill is owned and operated by George Little who also owns a good deal of property in the city. He is mill owner, farmer, store keeper and landowner. He put the Terrace townsite on the market and he is also interested in other outside ventures. His mill at Terrace cuts about three million feet of lumber a year; and he is now turning out some spruce for the Imperial Munitions Board.

There is a telephone system in the town which connects up practically all the houses and is operated on the automatic system, thus doing away with the necessity of an operator. The tennis club provides recreation and so seldom are the people ill that there is no doctor. A place that starves the doctor must be all right.

Speaking of the district of which Terrace is the centre, Dr. Grant in his address last Sunday evening, told of the richness of the valley, the wonderful clover that is grown there and the flavor of its berries.

To mention berries reminds one that there are an abundance of wild berries throughout the district. Raspberries abound everywhere. They are not as large as the cultivated varieties but they are very good and there is hardly any limit to the quantities. Besides the raspberries, black and red, there are found saskatoons, three varieties of blueberries, huckleberries, soapberries, wild cherries, cranberries, high bush and low, thimble or salmon berries, pigeon berries, wild currants and gooseberries, and the picturesque red berries which grow on the devil's clubs.

This is the last of the series of sketches of the district but all has not yet been said by any means.

DAWSON

John Nevin of Gold Bottom whose death occurred recently at Dawson, was 82 years of age. He had been in the Yukon 18 years, coming from Vancouver and earlier still from Scotland. The pallbearers at the funeral were: John McCrimmon, Harry McCrimmon, Mr. Stitts, Roderick Fraser, Andrew Larsen and George N. Hartley.

John Kennalley, a young American living here, has responded to the call and left for the States. He already has seen service, as he was in Russia with Col. Boyle and was decorated by General Korniloff at that time. For some time past he has been connected with the Klondike Mining Co.

Among those who have recently gone out for the winter are Mrs. Guy C. Churchward and children, Alfred Bedker, the well known Hunker Creek operator, who has been here since 1897; P. A. Knudson, a well known business man, whose son is going to the front.

John Martin and his nephew, John Rabbit, have set out on a trip overland from Dawson to Fort McPherson. They will travel nearly five hundred miles by trail and canoe and expect to be twenty days on the journey. Three dogs have been taken for pack animals and when the snow comes they will be used on sleighs. The party have taken plenty of food and rifles and expect to return in the spring.

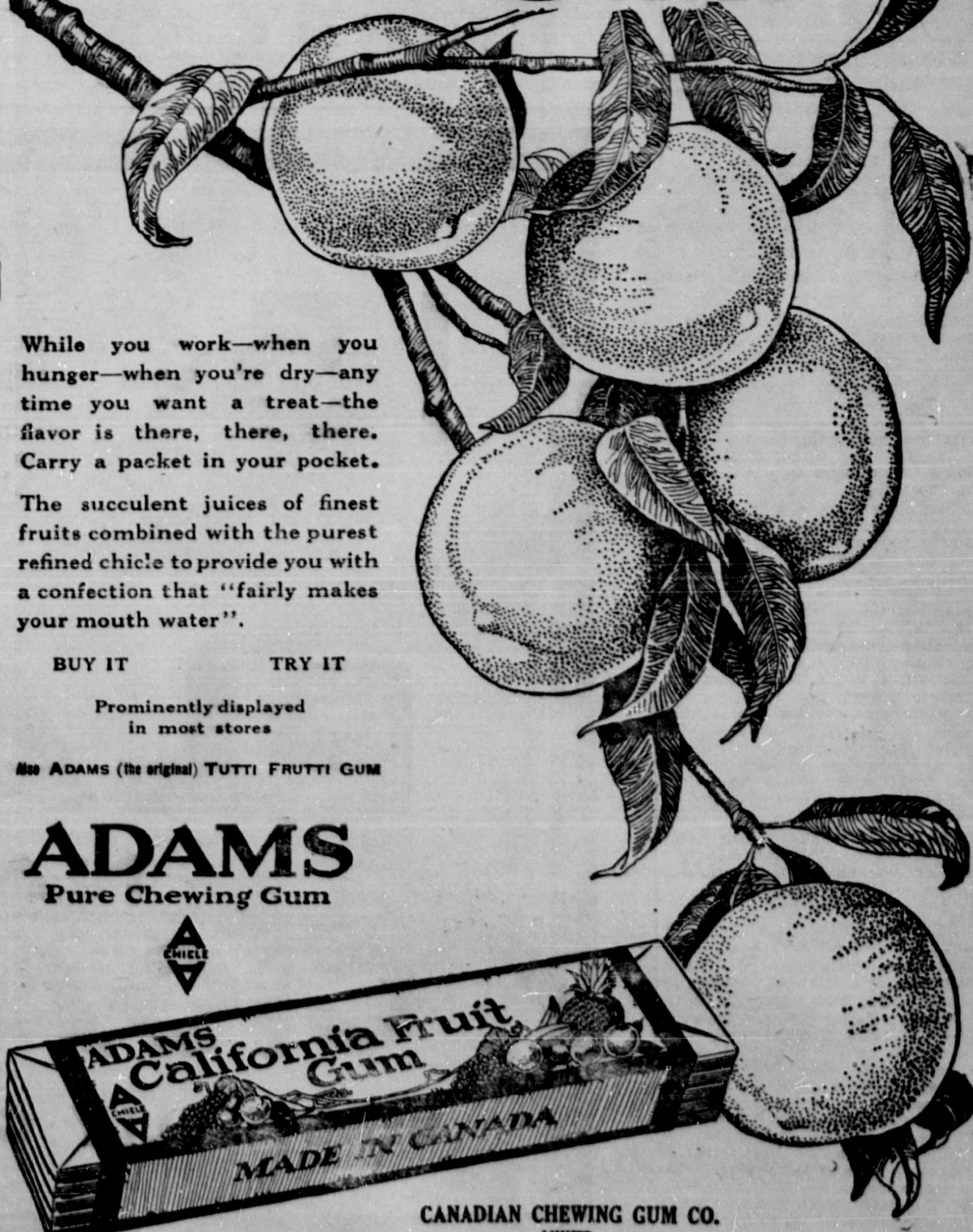
