## GERMAN DREAM OF PEACE TERMS

Wonderful suggestion of German Papers as to How Settlement Might Be Effectuated.

London, August 28.—The German newspapers have been full the last week or two discussing terms of peace. Now they see the uselessness of doing on. While they seemed to be getting the better of the fighting they were hopeful that the Allies might be induced to patch up a peace. Some of the terms proposed were ridiculous. Among the more reasonable, yet still impossible, were the following:

The "League of Nations" would be acceptable, provided Germany were first given everything she asks for, viz., Colonies; the reduction of all nations to the size of her own; the recognition of her position in the East as created by her own exploitation of the Great Litvak peace.

### Belgium and Serbia.

As regards Belgium and Serbia those must be left for Germany and Austria to treat with, without any outside intervention. Belgium is however to be "completely restored as an independent sovereign State (compensation not mentioned, nor who is to pay for the 'restoring')."

All merchants belonging to the Central Powers who have been deprived of their property overseas to be restored to their former rights of possession.

England to evacuate unconditionally the Turkish territories she has occupied, and Turkey to regain her suzerainty over Egypt.

The Dardanelles to be open to the shipping of Black Sea states (all of whom Germany doubtless expects to dominate).

### No Regrets.

There is nothing in these proposals to suggest that Germany regrets having set out to conquer the world or even abandon her design. She only consents to let it stand over for the present—in return for something on account. Of any prospect of a better world, where the mad ambition of a few will no longer have the power to plunge the globe into mourning, Herr Bernhard provides no glimpse. He speaks of the League of Nations as something remote from reality, and even so does not suggest that Germany would accept the idea except when she had first got everything she wanted, and provides that (1) sea power is eliminated; (2) colonial armies such as France and Britain possess are prohibited. On the other hand Germany would be left in

the enjoyment of a huge galvanized military force, not only Germans but of Hungarians, Albanians and Slavs of all kinds.

### Colossal Impudence.

The suggestion that Germany alone shall deal with Belgium and France alone with Serbia is colossal impudence. We saw in 1914 the attitude the first named of each pair is likely to adopt towards the second and weaker.
