There is to be a general tag and the proceeds will be devoted to men and the dependents of the men of the navy and mercantile marine. Considering the fact that nothing except the navy has saved the world from German domination, it is certainly fitting that all unite to help the men who have done such noble work.

The navy is a great silent machine that works effectively in the dark and guards the shores of Britain, protects the commerce of the nations of the world, and in the day of extremity did its part even on land in holding back the furious Hun.

It is for the men of the navy and their dependents that the members of the Prince Rupert branch of the Navy League of Canada appeal on Saturday. It is a great cause and the people here will undoubtedly rise to the occasion and do their duty. There are more or less regular appeals for the soldiers, but only now and then is the call sent out for the men of the sea. This is a seaport town and for that reason the appeal is one that goes right home.

Germans Simply
Shortening Their Lines.

The German official announcement of the retirement is a very innocent affair. To judge by it no one would imagine that there had been heavy fighting with immense casualties during the last few weeks. The Germans have been simply shortening the line. That is all.

The German line will need more shortening before the end comes. The Allies under the unity of one command are driving steadily, but not in too sensational a manner. They are bringing up their guns and supplies as fast as the armies move forward and the result is stability of movement and a gain that really means something.

Pioneer Missionary
Wins Undying Fame.

The passing of William Duncan, the missionary who early visited these parts and endeared himself to the Indian population through his devotion to their interests, is an event that cannot pass unnoticed. The veteran missionary was in this district for something like sixty years and he stands out clearly as the one man more than any other who helped the Indians to attain that degree of civilization for which the natives of this part of British Columbia are noted. He was a man who did things and who inspired others to do. That he was not inclined to be subservient to a newcomer after he had built up the mission here through his individual effort, was not to be wondered at. Such however is the fate of many of the world's best workers. They build while others tear down or stand by and criticize. William Duncan has made an undying name for himself, which will pass down through history among the names of great and good and useful men. Just how much he did no one can yet tell. Sowing the seeds of civilization in those early days meant everything to those who followed. His name will be remembered and revered long after all the relics of ecclesiasticism have been buried and forgotten.

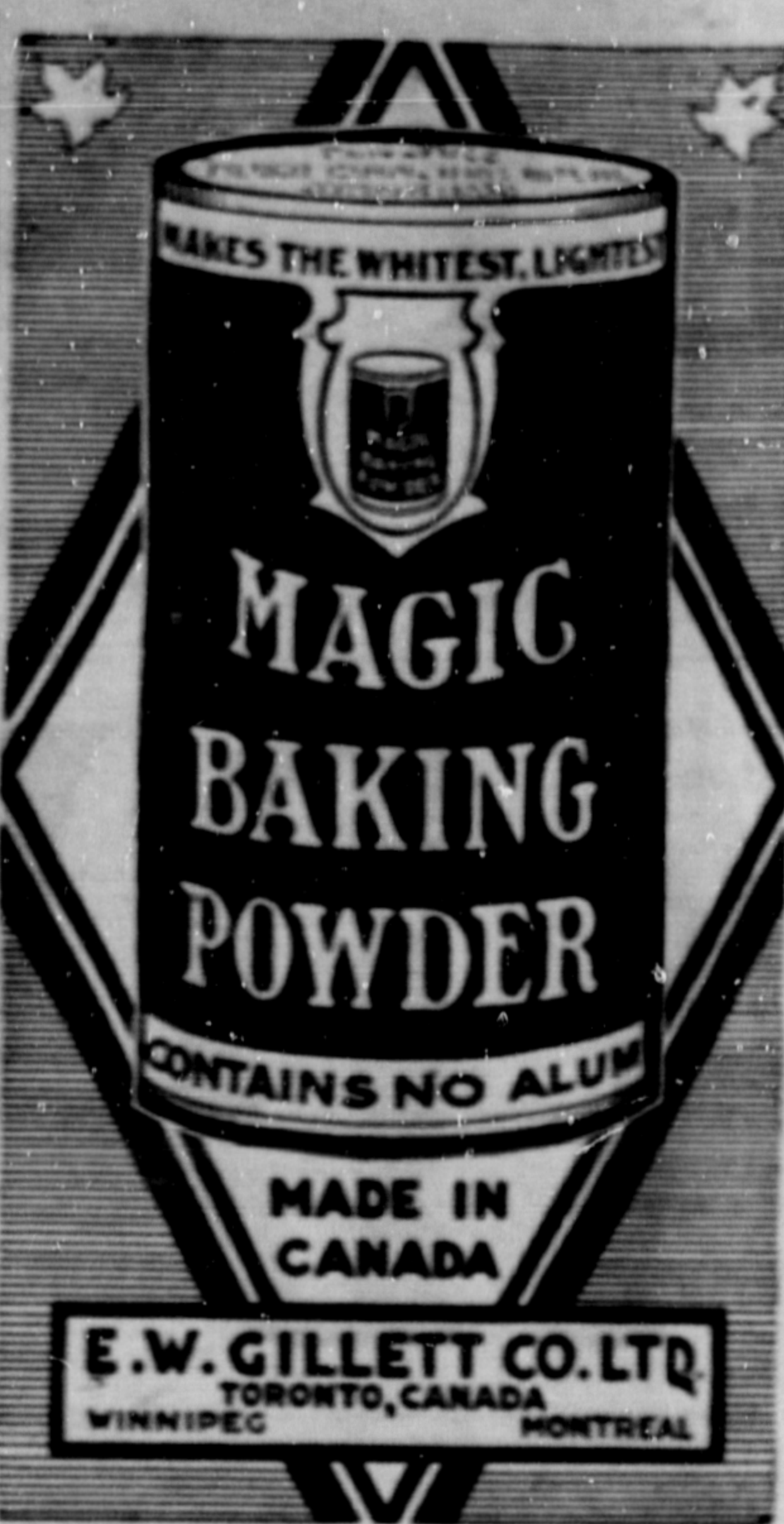

City and Town Labor
Must Save
The Food Situation

THE heart of the food production problem is labor, and the heart of the labor problem is the city dweller. City people must produce food if Canada is to do her full duty in support of our soldiers and Allies.

Men who are needed on farms must come from the cities and towns—there is no other source. The Provincial Departments of Agriculture co-operating with the Canada Food Board, can place thousands of men on good farms in this Province. They are needed at once.

Those who remain at home must also Grow Food

A War Garden will not excuse the man whose rightful place this year is on a farm. But War Garden service is needed from those who can do no more.

Every pound of home-grown vegetables, produced on city land by city labor, will be a positive addition to the food supply. Home Garden

and Vacant Lot cultivation will leave the farmers free to grow more food for export.

The vegetable garden offers an opportunity for service to men whose circumstances make it impossible for them to work on a farm, to women, to boys and girls—to city people generally.
