### TESTED HYDROPLANE

G. R. Naden, deputy minister of  
lands, has been in charge of the  
testing of the hydroplane which  
was recently built for the depart-  
ment at Vancouver. The plane  
was at first not quite satisfactory  
but some slight alterations have  
resulted in the tests being quite  
satisfactory.

The hydroplane is capable of  
climbing to between 5,000 and  
6,000 feet, that altitude being  
about the average for that type of  
flier. It is equipped with a 100-  
h.p. Roberts motor capable of  
driving it at a speed of about 65  
miles an hour. The machine,  
which will cost the Government  
about \$8,000, has been accepted.
