SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., July 13:- "After Lausanne, Ottawa," was the message of Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council and head of the British delegation to the Empire economic conference at Ottawa, as the steamer Empress of Britain sailed today for Canada with the British, South African, Indian, Northern Ireland and Southern Rhodesian delegations to the confer-

"We are leaving," Mr. Baldwin said, "with the full hope that we shall be able to add a further step towards the revival of world trade to crown the first year's work of the National government by agreeing at Ottawa upon a policy of freer trade which will lay the foundation of a great expansion of Empire trade to the mutual advantage of us
