SEPARATE AMERICAN ARMY BEING FORMED AT THE BATTLEFRONT

U. S. Battalions Hitherto Brigaded
With British and French
Troops Join Pershing.

LARGE SHIPMENT OF AEROPLANES READY

Washington, Sept. 12.—Ameri-
can troops brigaded with the Brit-
ish and French forces, are being
withdrawn as rapidly as possible
to join the first American field
army under General Pershing.

General March said today in his
weekly conference with members
of the senate military committee.
The chief of staff threw no new
light on the part Americans are
playing in the present offensive,
but the impression was given that
the program of concentrating the
army for action under General
Pershing was going forward sat-
isfactorily.

Shipments of De Havilland air-
planes, which were temporarily
held up on the order of Secretary
of War Baker, so certain changes
could be made in them, General
March said, were resumed this
week.

Reports received up to today by
the war department show that
1,003 De Havilland airplanes had
been completed and made ready to
turn over to the government this
week and 765 had been shipped or
were already en route overseas.
