#### EMBARGO ON GOLD

New York, Sept. 16 .- Canada's embargo on the export of coin, bullion or bars from the Dominion, which is similar in purpose and design to the measure adopted by the United States attracts a fresh interest in the gold and silver movement between the two neighbor countries. The war has brought many changes in the relations between Canada and the United States, but none more unique than the movement of bullion over the international border.

To begin with, Canada assumed abnormal importance from the gold standpoint by reason of becoming the "channel" for the British gold flow to this country prior to America becoming a belligerent. Of recent months Canada has figured importantly it would appear in the silver stream to India via this country.


