# LAUSANNE TREATY IS IN LIMELIGHT

## POLICE AND STRIKERS IN WINNIPEG STAGE TWO CLASHES

### France and Great Britain At Disagreement As To Whether U. S. Debts Come Under Pact

Herriot Sees Pact as Resurrection of Entente Cordiale—Italy Announces It Will Also Adhere to New Consultative Agreement

PARIS, July 14.—The first immediate consequence of the new co-operative agreement between France and Great Britain announced yesterday is that Britain in future cannot undertake to make war debt payments to the United States without first consulting France, Premier Edouard Herriot told the finance committee of the Chamber of Deputies last evening.

The new accord, Premier Herriot said, complement to a "gentlemen's agreement," is that debtors of the United States would not ratify the Lausanne treaty until each had obtained beforehand an acceptable settlement of its own debts.

M. Herriot said that he conceived the Franco-British agreement as a resurrection of the Entente Cordiale and the opening of a new era in Franco-British relations.

The French foreign office this afternoon published the text of the "gentlemen's agreement" by which the principal powers concerned in the Treaty of Lausanne agreed not to ratify that treaty until each had obtained a satisfactory settlement of its own debt.

#### Britain Differs

LONDON, July 14.—It was officially announced last night that the new Franco-British accord has nothing whatever to do, implicitly or explicitly, with the debts owed to the United States.

There is no truth in any statement that the accord is applicable to the matter of British debts to the United States.

It was revealed that Great Britain and United States representatives had held a secret session before the Franco-British accord was reached at which virtual agreement had been reached on the subject of war debts and reparations.

#### Italy Adheres

ROME, July 14.—The charge d'affaires at the Italian embassy in London was instructed to inform the British government that Italy is glad to adhere to the Franco-British consultative pact which was announced yesterday.

### Sockeye Run Falling Off

Gillnetters on Skeena River Reported to Be Having Quiet Time—Trollers Are Still Busy

A great falling-off in the sockeye run on the Skeena River is reported by arrivals from there today. Gillnet boats are said to be doing next to nothing.

A good run of fish, however, continues on the trolling grounds, it is stated.

#### NO HALIBUT SALE

### Outline of Treaty in Regard To St. Lawrence Waterway Is Reached, Premier Bennett Says

OTTAWA, July 14.—An official statement in regard to the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence seaway was issued yesterday as follows:

"Announcement was made from the Prime Minister's office today that, after a long period of intensive negotiation, an outline of a treaty was concluded at the middle of June, the final terms of which were settled yesterday.

"A formal treaty is now being prepared and will be ready for signature at an early date at which time a full statement by the governments concerned will be issued."

BALTIMORE, Maryland, July 14.—A Baltimore Sun dispatch states that the first rough draft of a treaty between Canada and United States for development of the St. Lawrence River waterway from Duluth to the sea has been completed and approved by President Herbert Hoover.

### BURGLARY CHARGED

William Fishuk Taken By Police in Connection With Breaking and Entering

William Nick Fishuk was arrested on the other side of the harbor today by Constables R. C. Gilker and G. A. Wyman of the city detachment of the provincial police and is to be charged tomorrow morning with burglary in connection with the recent breaking and entering of the Swift Canadian Co. warehouse on the local waterfront and a cabin on Mount Morse belonging to W. H. Montgomery of this city. Recovery of goods taken from both places led to the arrest of Fishuk.

The Montgomery cabin was entered on Monday of this week at 11 blankets, a 30-30 rifle, ammunition, alarm clock, etc. removed.

The Swift warehouse was broken into on Tuesday night and eight dozen eggs, \$8 in stamps and other articles taken.

It is expected Fishuk will be remanded for eight days on coming up tomorrow.

### SEEKING KILLERS

Manitoba Mounted Police Searching For Men Who Killed Farmer Near Rosburn

ROSSBURN, Man., July 14.—Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers were today scouring the bush country surrounding this Northern Manitoba hamlet for two unidentified men who shot and killed James Lee and seriously wounded his wife last night at the Lee's cabin seven miles north of here.

### JAIL BREAK IN ONTARIO

51. Prisoners Make Getaway From Industrial Farm—Only Three Still at Liberty

SUDBURY, Ont., July 14.—Smashing their way through a strong wooden door while guards were in the next room, six prisoners made a break for liberty at Burwash industrial farm last night.

One of the prisoners was shot through the hip and, with two others, was recaptured. Three are still at liberty.

### CONEY ID. HAS FIRE

New York Pleasure Resort Swept By \$2,000,000 Blaze—Panic-Stricken People Rioted

NEW YORK, July 14.—Coney Island, New York's great recreational centre, was threatened with complete destruction yesterday by fire which wiped out five blocks of the resort, causing estimated damage of \$2,000,000.

Thousands of panic-stricken pleasure-seekers staged a riot as the flames swept the island, finally taking refuge in the water.

The fire is believed to have been caused by careless boys throwing a lighted match on to the croquet board walk.

### KILLED IN LONG FALL

Miss Grace Hall Drops Five Storeys to Pavement Below Vancouver Hotel Room

VANCOUVER, July 14.—Miss Grace Hall, aged 26, while sitting at an open window in a downtown hotel last night, lost her balance and fell five storeys to the pavement beneath. She died while being taken to hospital.

### One Man Critically Injured And Others Are Badly Cut Up

Four of Ringleaders Placed Under Arrest Today in Addition to Four on Tuesday Night—Men Interfered With Strikebreakers at Box Factory Plant

WINNIPEG, July 14.—One man was critically injured and scores received minor cuts and bruises in a second clash here today between police and striking employees of the F. J. Welwood box factory. Four of the ringleaders, including the injured man; were placed under arrest. Four were also arrested on Tuesday night in a set-to with the police.

Two policemen and a number of strikers were admitted to hospital suffering with injuries suffered in Tuesday night's rioting when the police interfered with strikers who were attempting to attack workers filling their places.

### MINISTER BACK HERE

Hon. R. W. Bruhn Heads Nothing From Victoria Regarding Government's Relief Plans

After making a trip to Stewart to look into the unemployment situation there, Hon. R. W. Bruhn, provincial minister of public works, returned to the city on the forestry patrol launch Lillian D. this morning and will leave by this afternoon's train on his return to Victoria via Jasper Park.

Mr. Bruhn had expected, on his arrival here today, to have heard something from Victoria in regard to the government's plans for unemployment relief but he had received no information up to noon.

The minister of public works was accompanied here from Stewart by J. A. Anderson, road superintendent for Atlin district, who will return tomorrow afternoon on the Prince Rupert to his headquarters at Atlin.

### SOCIALISTS ORGANIZED

T. J. Shenton Named President of New Political Party Here—J. S. Black is Secretary

A branch of the Socialist Party of Canada was organized at a meeting in Prince Rupert Wednesday night with officers as follows:

The meeting, which was well attended, was opened by T. J. Shenton, Labor candidate for Atlin district in the forthcoming provincial election, who outlined the aims and objects of the party. Following a discussion of some length, it was decided to form a branch of the Labor Party of Canada. All those who had voted for the motion were then invited to remain behind for the purpose of electing officers. Discussion along organization lines took place and the meeting adjourned to convene again at the call of the chair.

### PATRIARCH OF METLAKATLA PASSES AWAY

Charles Powell, Aged 80, Last of Followers of Late Father Duncan, Died Suddenly

Charles Powell, aged 80, last of the followers of the late Father Duncan, passed away suddenly at the neighboring village of Metlakatla yesterday. He had been engaged for years as a storekeeper at Metlakatla and is survived by a widow and daughter.

The funeral will take place at Metlakatla on Saturday from the Church of England with Haynor Bros. in charge of arrangements.

### PROTEST AT PLAN

Government's Proposed Relief Scale Not Acceptable to Union B.C. of Municipalities

VANCOUVER, July 14.—Taking exception to the British Columbia government's proposed new direct relief plans, the executive of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities, at a meeting here, decided to apply direct to Ottawa for a federal representative to study the unemployment relief problems of the province.

Under the government's proposal, relief for an average family consisting of parents and one child would be fixed at \$20 per month and single men would receive \$10. This, it is claimed, is inadequate.
