WHAT I SAW ALONG THE PIPE LINE



The voice of the jay is raucous and unpleasant. This fellow followed me almost all the way to the end of the walk, but happily he did not talk much. He just fluttered around, and near the end of the walk was joined by

a companion. Jays are very curious. They always "want to know, don't you know." They run great risks in order to satisfy this curiosity, but as they are innocent creatures. not many people take advantage of them. Now and then a boy with more energy than brains throws a stone at one, but the jay soon detects danger of that sort.

Sparrows and Thrushes.

There were a number of other birds, some of which came out to look at me and others of which slunk away into the bushes. For instance, the fox sparrow was rather curious and hopped out on to the side of the walk and investigated before again seeking refuge in the bushes. The little thrushes, perhaps hermit thrushes or else russetbacked, did not stop to look but were away before there was a chance to get acquainted.

The juncoes with their nobby black heads were seen a good many times and they were very friendly, but the chickadees and some other birds that were too far away to identify kept pretty well to the tree tops. Once a little western winter wren hopped out on to the edge of the bushes and pretended not to notice me, yet at the same time taking a sly peep in my direction as he pecked at some buds. That is a little habit the wren has. He hardly ever lets you know that he sees you, but all the time he is watching you carefully . .

Bird Song and Beauty.

On the way home a short bird song in the bushes by Hays Creek the first I had heard for some time in Prince Rupert, was that of a Sooty Song Sparrow that had forgotten it was not spring. As I watched and listened a kingfisher came leping along under the bridge and alighted on a bough some little way up the stream and watched for an opportunity to pounce on a fish beneath.
