FRANCE AND BRITAIN

Until comparatively a few years ago France and Great Britain were open enemies. They never lost an opportunity of showing their animosity. On many occasions there was open warfare and so fearful were the British of their neighbor that they would not allow a tunnel to be constructed beneath the Straits of Dover.

The war brought a change, but still there were suspicions and the animosity between France and Germany was shown whenever Britain seemed to favor the latter. Now there is a new administration and the Herriot government is showing a new spirit. Premier Ramsay MacDonald, the socialist premier of Britain, has been negotiating with the socialist premier of France to good effect and a new understanding has been reached which promises great things for the future peace of the world.

Nations are now learning to deal with each other in a similar manner to individuals. United States has led the way in the matter of open diplomacy and the new understanding with France is a very decided forward step which should have a great effect on the diplomacy of other nations. Secret treaties are going into the discard and a genuine effort is being made which will tend to do away with war as a means of settling international disputes.

WARS SETTLE NOTHING

The result of the great war confirms what Norman Angell tried to teach at the beginning of this century when he published a book designed to show the futility of armed conflict. He reasoned that the winner lost as well as the loser and he has been shown to be correct. It is clear now that wars settle nothing and that there is no kind of dispute that could not be settled amicably if the parties thereto were amenable to reason. The glory is passed from warfare and, now that it is shown that the profit is also gone, it is probable that wars will become fewer until they disappear as a relic of barbarism.
