Indian summer weather prevails on the Queen Charlotte Islands. The "oldest settler" asserts that the "weather clerk" has been furnishing more sunshine than usual, which has been appreciated by the numerous residents.

Buildings are going up in all directions at Port Clements and Buckley Bay. Carpenters are in demand at the highest rate of wages. There is room for laborers and mechanics on Masset Inlet. The south end of the islands is also calling for men to work at the various industries.

Rev. J. Gillett interred the remains of Edgar Nastow, who died recently at Masset. The deceased was a native son of the Queen Charlotte Islands, and was aged 70 years. His death is attributed to pneumonia, which carried him off in the short space of a few hours, after he was attacked with the disease. The deceased leaves a large number of relatives and friends.

The Ocean Falls Pulp and Paper Company installed a camp at Dinin Bay, upper Masset Inlet. The logging outfit was towed across Heate Straits and formed quite a procession of scows. It is the intention to cut timber all the year round and ship in the spring to the principal plant of the company. USE LESS SUGAR

The Food Control Board is gradually tightening up on the use of sugar, the latest order promulgated is in part as follows:

No public eating place (except soda fountain or ice cream parlors) shall use more than two pounds of sugar for every ninety meals served.

No proprietor of a soda fountain or ice cream parlor shall after September 30, 1918, use more than 25 per cent. of the average monthly amount of sugar used during the year 1917.

No person shall use in the manufacture of biscuits, or fruit, pound, layer, wine, sponge cake or any like product more than 40 pounds of sugar to 100 pounds of flour.

W. J. Bowser, of Victoria, member of the Legislature for Vancouver and leader of the opposition, arrived in the city yesterday and is remaining a couple of days before leaving for Terrace, Hazelton, Smithers, Vanderhoof and Prince George.

In conversation with a News representative Mr. Bowser said that he would not hold any meetings, as to do so might arouse political animosity, and today all were interested in winning the war more than in politics. He was just visiting the district to keep in touch with the developments that were going on in the north. He had intended going to the Queen Charlotte Islands, but found that it was difficult to know exactly when he would be able to get back, so he had decided not to go there nor to Anyox. He expected to leave, possibly on Friday, for Terrace.

Mr. Bowser is looking well. He was met at the dock by O. H. Nelson of this city and canvassed the local situation with him.
