# VICTORY AGAIN

## BIG DRIVE FORWARD WEST OF VERDUN

### BULGARIANS BEING CHASED BY ALLIED FORCES; CHANGES IN RUSSIA

#### SEVEN MILES FORWARD ON FRONT OF 20 MILES; 5000 PRISONERS BEEN TAKEN WEST OF VERDUN

Twelve Towns Captured by American and French Armies Yesterday After Stubborn Resistance Reports General Pershing to Washington Government.

Washington, September 27.—Attacking yesterday over a front of twenty miles west of Verdun, in co-operation with the French the American First Army advanced to an average depth of seven miles and captured twelve towns and more than 5,000 prisoners, General Pershing's report states. In section "A" this morning, north of Verdun, the First Army attacked the enemy on a front of twenty miles and penetrated his line to an average depth of seven miles. Pennsylvania, Kansas and Missouri troops, serving Major General Liggett's corps, stormed Varrenes, Mont Blainville, Vauzere and Chappy, after stubborn resistance. Troops of other corps, crossing Forges Brook, captured Bois de Forges and wrested from the enemy the towns of Malancourt, Bethincourt, Mont Faucon, Ouisy, Nantilles, Zepzargee, Danneoux and Mercourt Et Drillancourt. The prisoners thus far reported number over 5,000.  
This drive is northward up the Meuse valley and if continued with success is likely to endanger the German positions westerly around St. Quentin. The probability is that the Germans will retire in that sector before long.

#### PRINTING IN ENEMY LANGUAGES FORBIDDEN

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—No more newspapers, tracts, pamphlets, books or any other kind of publications are to be issued in Canada in enemy languages until after the war. This has been decided upon by the Government and an Order-in-Council has been passed translating the decision into law. Authority is taken for seizing of such plants and destruction of objectionable matter. The licensing privilege affords the method of close control and regulation. It is also illegal to save copies of banned publications already in possession.

#### LETHONIANS APPEAL TO WORLD AGAINST GERMAN OPPRESSION

Washington, Sept. 27.—The inhabitants of Lethonia, one of the Russian border provinces seized by the Germans under the Brest-Litovsk treaty, have addressed a formal protest to all nations of the world against their fate. After having, without result, addressed themselves to the German Chancellor, they now appeal to the outside world in vehement protest against their oppressors.

#### GETTING PUBLICITY

The following clipping is taken from the Monetary Times, Toronto, of recent date:—"Contracts for the construction of five steel ships for the Norwegian government have been let and they will be constructed in Prince Rupert, B. C. John Little, of Pittsburg, head of the construction company, is expected in Prince Rupert this fall. Besides the construction of steel freighters much repair work will also be undertaken. It is expected that work will be received soon to commence grading at the site of the shipyards to be erected at Hays Creek."

#### BORDEN RESTING

#### BULGARIANS Routed BY ALLIED TROOPS ON BOTH SIDES OF GREAT SALIENT

**EFFORT BEING MADE TO REACH USKUB AND THUS MAKE VICTORY COMPLETE — GERMAN REINFORCEMENTS UNABLE TO CHECK BIG ADVANCE**

London, September 27.—Reports received emphasized the demoralization of the Bulgarians who are retreating in confusion, leaving behind an enormous amount of material and probably many thousands of prisoners, as the allied troops strain every energy to get to Uskub and thereby make their victory complete. It is pointed out that the Bulgarian army, estimated to aggregate 300,000 men, is in a dangerous position, but the victory will not be decisive, in the opinion of military experts, until Uskub, the centre of all enemy communication lines, is captured. If that is accomplished it is believed the victory will be numbered among the few decisive ones of the war.  
The renewed resistance of Bulgarian rearguards and the arrival of German reinforcements in Macedonia have not succeeded in stemming the great allied advance.  
British cavalry yesterday entered Bulgaria opposite Kosturino, thus avoiding the Belachista mountains which, it was feared, might bar its progress, while Serbians, French, Greeks and British troops routed the Bulgarians from either side of the great salient, which now stretches far into Serbia.

#### SHIPS SUNK BY HURRICANE

Such Damage Done Off Lower Californian Coast—City of LaPaz is Partially Destroyed.

San Diego, Calif., Sept. 27.—The United States Shipping Board vessels on their maiden trips were sunk and a fleet of other craft were badly battered; the City of LaPaz was partially destroyed, and the floating equipment of the United States naval depot at Pichilique was damaged to the extent of thousands of dollars during a terrific hurricane that raged off the lower California and northwest coast of Mexico.

#### CANADIAN VESSELS SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Good Catches of fish lost Through Action of Enemy Raider on East Coast.  
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Sept. 27.—The loss of nine vessels valued at \$264,000 and laden with fish worth \$136,000 through activities of a submarine off the Atlantic coast, is shown by a fisheries statement for August. Another vessel from Yarmouth laden with a good catch of fish, was also destroyed by a raider.  
An Atlantic Port, Sept. 27.—The American steam trawler King Fisher has been torpedoed and sunk 85 miles off the north Atlantic coast. The crew of 27 reached here safely.

#### JAPANESE CABINET RESIGNS OFFICE

Tokio, Sept. 27.—The Japanese cabinet headed by Field Marshal Count Terauchi which has held office since October, 1916, has resigned.

#### ARMY OF 200,000 HAS BEEN FORMED IN SIBERIA AND 30,000 OFFICERS THERE

**CENTRAL AUTHORITY EMERGING IN RUSSIA, WHICH IT IS HOPED WILL RE-ESTABLISH LAW AND ORDER IN A DEVASTATED LAND**

Washington, September 27.—A despatch to the Russian Embassy from M. Golovascheff, Assistant Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Omsk Government, says that an army of more than 200,000 men has been formed in Siberia by conscription and there are 30,000 officers available there to train and lead it. The army is being organized on the basis of strict discipline and will constitute an increasingly powerful force to operate with the Allied and Czecho-Slovak forces in Siberia.

With the safe arrival of United States Consul General Poole at Stockholm from Moscow additional information concerning the conditions in Central Russia have been obtained. The massacre of Russians in Moscow was continuing September 9 with about 150 executions nightly. More than 1,000 persons have been shot in retaliation for an attempt to kill Lenine, the Bolshevik premier.  
Washington, Sept. 27.—Out of the chaos which has existed in Russia since the overthrow of the Kerensky Government by the Bolsheviks there is emerging a central authority which officials and diplomats here hope will be able to re-establish order and renew the fight against the common enemy. Official information has reached the Russian Embassy that the pan-Russian conference at Ufa, European Russia, which has been recognized by the Provisional Governments opposing the Bolsheviks, including the Siberian Government, has constituted a committee of five as the lawful authority for all Russia.

#### BRITISH STILL DRIVING TURKS IN PALESTINE

Many More Points Occupied and Enemy Retreating Northward Followed by the Allied Forces.  
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, Sept. 27.—The British forces have occupied the most important Turkish centre of Amman on the Jedjaz railway, thirty miles east of the Jordan. The Turks are retreating northward along the railway and are being closely pursued by the Allies.

British troops operating in Palestine are extending their occupation about the Sea of Galilee. They have occupied Tiberias and Semakh, on the borders of that sea, and Essamura.  
British casualties during the offensive were less than one-tenth the number of prisoners taken from the Turks, the announcement states.

#### GRANTED DIVORCE

#### DROP BOMBS ON TOWN NOTED FOR SAUSAGES

London, Sept. 27.—British airmen yesterday dropped bombs on the German city of Frankfurt. Five enemy machines were shot down. Four British airplanes are missing.  
London, Sept. 27.—Two British divisions have captured in the last few days the German system of trenches and strong points northwest of St. Quentin with 1,500 prisoners. There were only minor encounters yesterday.  
Paris, Sept. 27.—The Franco-American attack on both sides of Argonne is continuing satisfactorily. French troops have made an advance of nearly four miles on certain points west of Argonne.
