ANOTHER PROTEST AT FISHING PRIVILEGES

It is not only in this district that the action of the Fisheries Department of the Dominion Government is giving dissatisfaction. Word comes from the Fraser river that a vigorous protest against the granting by the Deparament of Fisheries to A. H. Sherman, of the Defiance Packing Co., Ltd., of a licence for seine fishing in Howe Sound, is being made by Fraser River fishermen. A petition is now in circulation and is being largely signed by them, objecting to the according of such privilege, more especially in view of the fact that they have sustained a heavy loss this season by the poor catch on the Fraser, and had planned to recoup themselves by fishing on Howe Sound

The petition states that inquiry has already been made at the fishery office where the information has been given out that the licence has been issued to Mr. Sherman for the purpose of supplying cheap fish to the people of British Columbia. In this regard the petition declares that the Federal Government has already taken steps to supply not only this province, but all the Western States with cheap fish, and for this purpose has subsidized fishing boats and evpress companies.
