**Is the Population
Of the City Increasing?**

There seems to be a general opinion that the population of the city is increasing. Judging from the street sales of The News which have increased more than one hundred per cent. there must be some change going on. Every few days it becomes necessary to print more papers and then sometimes the office runs out of a necessary supply. Back numbers are in demand a good deal and usually a few copies are saved to provide for it, but anyone wanting special papers would be wise to order ahead of time rather than waiting in expectation of getting back numbers. The Government has requested that white paper be conserved and The News will co-operate to the fullest extent possible. It must however print more copies from time to time to cope with the increasing circulation.

The distribution department is doing its best to see that the papers are sent every day but without the co-operation of the subscribers it is impossible to detect omissions. **Is Prince Rupert
A Dry Town?**

At the meeting of the Police Commissioners yesterday afternoon the question of the enforcement of the Prohibition Act in this city was discussed and it was suggested that a good deal of liquor was being sold here in contravention of the Act. Nobody seemed to know just to what extent the traffic was carried on, but all agreed that the price was \$16 a bottle though how much one would pay for "a smile" did not appear, neither did anyone divulge just where it was possible to get "a nip." Possibly it was to prevent the breaking up of the meeting before the formal resolution that the information was held back.

During the recent carnival doubtless there was considerable drinking in town, but the sobriety of the place was the subject of remark from many people. After midnight, the crowds on the streets and in the cabarets and cafes seemed to be as sober as they were early in the evening. If they secured intoxicants they did not get much, for very few people were seen that were any the worse for their acquaintance with old rye or any other brand.

**Object Lesson in
What Not to Do.**

It would seem from the recent dispatches as if some semblance of law and order would work out in Russia before long. For some time past the unhappy country has been in a state of turmoil and it will take a long time to bring it back to anything like good order. There has been an upset of conditions, ideals and methods that it may take half a century to evolve into a stable government. To go direct from an absolute government to a series of committee governments in a country where the majority of the people are ignorant must end in nothing but disorder. Education in government is as necessary as education in anything else. No one inherits a self governing instinct, for self government is something new. Even here we are only experimenting with it, and it is patent to everyone that it has never been wholly a success. We have much to learn and the Bolsheviks have much more.

Doubtless the majority of the Bolsheviks meant well. They were imbued with the idea that they were to be free, but instead of freedom they were given a period of license and it did not work well. The danger now is that the country may return to a condition in which the people will have little opportunity to educate themselves in self government and if that is the case, all the troubles are likely to be repeated at some future date. The steady pressure from beneath which has characterized the growth of the democratic movement in Great Britain has been the safe way. There has been steady development along sane lines, and today Great Britain is one of the most democratic countries in the world. After the war she is likely to lead still, for there are big changes in sight.

(Section 36 and 134.)

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Brenton G. Moore and Roy L. Moore of Prince Rupert, B.C. as owner in fee under a Tax Sale Deed from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 28th day of November, 1917, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot eighteen (18), Block eighteen (18), Section six (6), City of Prince Rupert, Map 923. 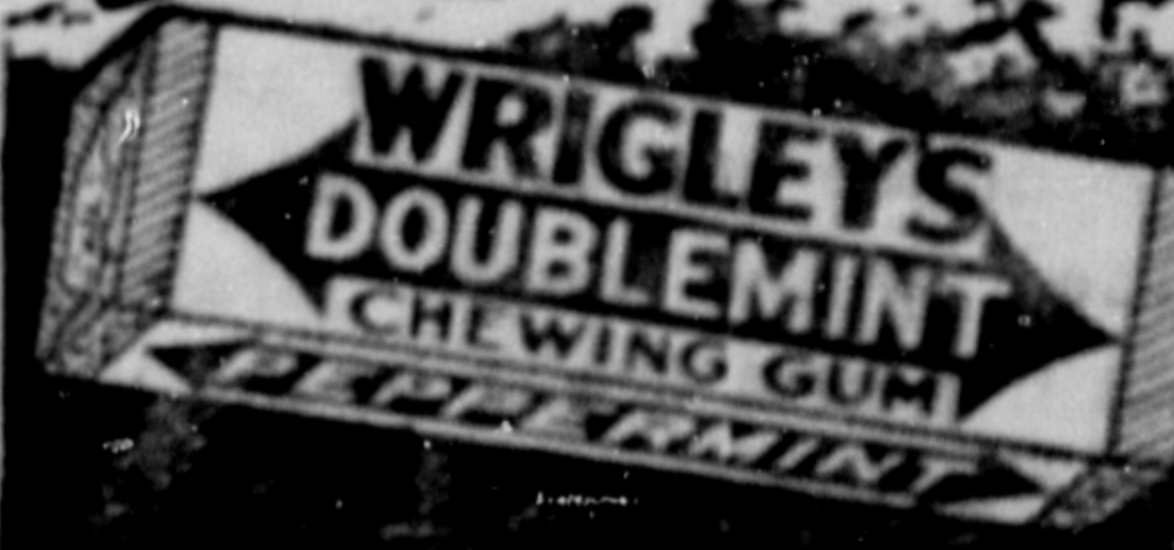
