**OFF TO ANYOX WITH BALL MEN**

Excursion Will Leave at Midnight For Copper City, Returning Tomorrow Evening; Good Program.

**TEAMS WILL CLASH IN FRIENDLY CONTEST**

The people of Prince Rupert are about to return the visit of the people of Anyox. The opportunity came sooner than was expected but the ball teams were anxious to try conclusions once more and it was necessary to do it now if it was to be done this season.

Accordingly an excursion will be run tonight to the smelter town by the Steamship Prince Rupert and it is expected that pretty nearly one hundred people will take advantage of the opportunity to go. Arrangements have been made for the visitors to see the smelter, the mine and the new coke ovens and any of the other wonders of the copper city. They will also have a chance to meet the copperites and incidentally have a pleasant evening trip home.

The boat leaves just after midnight tonight and returning gets away from Anyox at four on thereabouts tomorrow. That will get the party home in good time and yet enable the steamer to keep her schedule on the rest of the run south. There will be some music along and it is expected that a jolly time will be spent on the steamer.

Besides the big ball game a tennis match has been arranged between rival singles and doubles from this town and the crack players of Anyox and this town will be an added attraction to those going on the trip.

The get-together spirit which has been manifested of late between the different northern communities is showing itself in this visit and it is suggested that this is an excellent opportunity to cultivate the acquaintance of the men from the mining camps.
