Bulgaria is Out of War.

The news that Bulgaria is out of the war is the biggest news that has come from Europe since war was declared. It is the beginning of the breaking up of the Central Powers, and the moral effect on the other countries must be immense. Austria will be in a turmoil directly and if the trouble does not spread to Germany it will only be because of the manner in which the people are held down by the military caste.

The news from other parts of the front today is also good and while there will be temporary setbacks perhaps, the forward move should be steady until the final end.

Bulgaria was the only formidable trouble in the Balkan States. It was that country that kept Turkey in the war, because it was sure that if Turkey deserted Bulgaria would get a big slice of her territory.

The terms of the settlement with Bulgaria have not, at the time of writing, been sent through, but it is certain that they are perfectly satisfactory to the Allies.

Turkey will now want to make peace too, for she will find herself in an awkward position. Her armies are being driven out of Palestine and the German control of the Holy Land is gone forever. Taken together with the forward drive of the Allies in France, the present position of the Huns is anything but hopeful. The long period of waiting is at an end and now like Pitt in the days of the Georges we ask every morning "What new victory is there today?"

German Rulers Must Settle With People.

Dispatches this morning state that since July 18 the Allies have captured 200,000 prisoners. That is an enormous number, many more than would seem from the detailed news that comes from day to day. It has nothing to do with the losses in killed and wounded which doubtless are still larger. It is an indication of how the war is going.

The Germans must now be aware that they are losing and that they have nothing to hope from holding on. Just what they will do does not become apparent. They will have to act quickly if they expect to save anything. That they will do so is hardly likely for they have been deceiving their own people as to the actual condition of affairs and now it will be difficult to persuade them that they have lost. The worst foe that the rulers of the Fatherland will have to settle with, when the collapse comes, will be the people of their own country. They will have a settlement of accounts and by that time there will not be a Hohenzollern left there.

Substitutes For Aeroplane Spruce.

The wheat that is grown furthest north is of the best quality. It has more sustaining properties in it. So it is with the spruce. The timber is of a better quality than that grown further south and for that reason is in greater demand. It is tougher and more durable and well suited to aeroplane construction. The difficulty is that the timber is somewhat limited in amount. Just now the timber near the shore is being logged and soon it will be necessary to go farther inland for the supply. After that what? is the question that the members of the Munitions Board are asking. To answer that question they have been here investigating the possibilities of other timber replacing the spruce. Naturally they are not telling too much in regard to the business but what they have told is interesting, especially to those who are in the lumber business.

LAND REGISTRY ACT
(Section 36 and 134.)

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Brenton G. Moore and Roy L. Moore of Prince Rupert, B.
