**Titles Opposed
To Democratic Ideas.**

People are still discussing the question whether Canada should recognize titles and whether the Government should have anything to say in the recommending of people who are to receive them. Speaking generally it seems to be the opinion in the West that titles are a superfluity. That they are not only needless but harmful. They are opposed to the democratic idea and when made hereditary are vicious.

The consciousness of having earned the respect of one's country is the reward an ordinary honest man covets. He wants no recognition other than that. Especially is a worthy man opposed to being classed with those who have had nothing but wealth to recommend them. There has been altogether too much subservience to wealth. The man who has made a pile of money is the man who has had recognition.

**Old Country Custom
Often Ridiculous.**

In England it has been the custom from time to time to add to the number of titled people by recommending to the King that knighthoods, baronetcies, and sometimes earldoms be bestowed on men who have distinguished themselves, either by doing something really worth while or by donating large sums of money to the campaign funds of the party which is in power. That is to class the really meritorious with the really deserving and to bring both down to the level of those hereditary lords who have neither merit, money nor even intelligence to back their claims.

The mass of the Canadian people are wholly opposed to the giving of titles to any citizen. A man like Sir Arthur Currie has earned it if ever a man did, and only the other day he was a plain real estate and insurance agent whom no one suspected of having the qualities of leadership inborn in him. His work is the thing that stands out prominent and the title adds nothing to it. The only thing it does is to separate him to some extent from his old friends. To many it is a ridiculous distinction and carries with it neither honor nor fame but brings the holder a distinction which is not desirable or pleasant.

Many famous men have persistently refused to accept any titles. William Ewart Gladstone was one of those who saw no satisfaction in being an earl. The distinction of being a leader of men was much more to him and he refused again and again to be branded with any insignia which did not mean anything.

**People's Pictures
Are to Be Shown.**

British Columbia makes an annual donation to the funds of the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, whose representative is to lecture here tomorrow night and show what is reputed to be the finest lot of pictures ever seen. As there is some of the people's money invested in this institution it would be well for the people to see the pictures and learn for themselves whether the class of publicity that is being done is of the right order. Until recently the Pacific Northwest has been neglected by tourist agencies and the travelling public, but of late there has been a change, and this Tourist Association is doing a good deal to help bring about the change. A British Columbian, the mayor of Victoria, is the head of the Association, and another British Columbian, Herbert Cuthbert, formerly of Victoria, is the permanent secretary with headquarters at Seattle. Frank Branch Riley is the travelling publicity man in connection with the work and he will lecture under the auspices of the local Daughters of the Empire at the Empress Theatre Thursday night and show the pictures.

**Red Cross Library
Worthy of Support.**

The local Red Cross Society has established a lending library for the double purpose of adding to the funds of the society and of benefiting those who borrow the books. This was badly needed here. Some day Prince Rupert will have a public library that will be a credit to the town, but that is one of the things that are being wished for. In the meantime if the Red Cross people can supply the need and at the same time provide extra funds for the boys at the front it will have fulfilled a very useful purpose. Perhaps when the war is over the public library may be in sight.
