CHIEF NELSON DIES AT PORT SIMPSON

Was Eye Witness of Many Feuds Between Haidas and Tsimpsians Before Civilization Came.

The death of Chief Albert Nelson, of Port Simpson, is reported. The chief died last week in the hospital at Port Simpson and was one of the oldest men in the band. He is the last of the chiefs of the Port Simpson Indians who actually witnessed the feuds of the old days among the coast tribes, before civilization came to them. He had many recollections of "old unhappy, far-off things, and battles long ago." The history of many of the fights between the Haidas and the Tsimpsians during the raids of the former on the mainland was personal knowledge with him. Many times in his young days he had to take refuge in the interior from the descents of the fierce Queen Charlotte Island warriors on the coast villages and told tales of the strenuous defence put up by his people against their strong enemy.

The chief is being mourned by the whole tribe.

SAVE MAKE CANADA SECURE**STEWART**

The new wagon road from tide-water to the Bush mine will shortly be completed, about fifty men having been engaged in its construction all summer. The road is fourteen miles in length and has been built on a good grade, and it will be utilized during the winter as a sleigh road for the shipment of ore from the mine. It is expected that at least 2,000 tons of ore will be shipped averaging around \$250 per ton in gold and silver.

Bert F. Smith, a mining engineer from Mississippi, is looking over the camp. He spent some time last season in investigating a portion of the district.

The Mineral Hill Partnership operating the Joker claim adjoining the Big Missouri, have fifteen men engaged in development work and in the construction of mine buildings. R. Harris, of Hazelton, is manager.

A series of open cuts along a portion of the eastern boundary of the Big Missouri shows an extensive ore body, similar in character to the high-grade ore on the Joker.

A. L. Carruthers, district road engineer, is inspecting road and bridge work throughout the district.

An unoccupied residence on 4th St. was burned to the ground on Thursday, the roof of an adjoining cottage caught fire but was extinguished before any great damage was done. No cause for the fire can be assigned.
