B.C. POLITICAL CHANGES LOOKED FOR

CANADIANS LEAD FIELD IN KING'S PRIZE SHOOT AT BISLEY

Nine Marksmen From This Dominion Enter Final Trophy Stage

Quebec Men Tie For Leadership in Second Round—Lieut. Desmond Burke Eliminated But Officially Announced He Won Grand Aggregate

BISLEY, Eng., July 15.—Two Canadians, Capt. J. W. Boulden of Sherbrooke and Sergeant Alec Parnell of Verdun, Que., led the entire field in the second stage of the King's Prize shoot this afternoon and will shoot off for the silver medal. They each had a total of 146 out of a possible 150. Nine Canadians qualified for the final stage including A. E. Evans of Esquimalt with 141.

ONTARIO COUNTY ASKS FOR RELIEF

WINDSOR, Ont., July 15.—The Sandwich County Council will make immediate application to the provincial government authorities to be relieved of one-third of the cost imposed upon it in direct relief in the municipality.

TURN DOWN AMENDMENT

Dail Eirean Insists That Oath of Allegiance Be Abolished—Retaliatory Tariffs Effective

DUBLIN, July 15.—The Dail Eirean rejected an amendment inserted by the Senate of the Irish Free State in the bill for the abolition of the oath of allegiance by a vote of 71 to 61. The amendment would have had the effect of eliminating abolition of the oath.

Government supporters and packed galleries cheered in the Dail when President Eamonn de Valera declared that "Britain has no natural right to rule here."

Retaliation Effective LONDON, July 15.—Duties hitting heavily the most important agricultural products of the Irish Free State went into effect when the British government's retaliatory tariff became operative. The British government has imposed special tariffs against the Irish Free State in view of its refusal to pay its land annuities to Great Britain.

Another Man Under Arrest

Samuel Olsen, in Addition to William Nick Fishuk, Being Charged With Burglary

Samuel Olsen was placed under arrest by the city police yesterday in connection with the looting earlier in the week of the Swift-Canadian warehouse on the local waterfront and the prospecting cabin of W. J. Montgomery on Mount Morse. Like William Nick Fishuk, who was arrested the day previous, Olsen is being charged with burglary. The two men are coming up this afternoon for preliminary trial.

READY FOR CONFERENCE

International Bank Making Preparations For World Economic Parley Such as Suggested

BASLE, Switzerland, July 15.—The Bank of International Settlements has notified the League of Nations that it is beginning preparations for a coming world economic conference such as that suggested in connection with the co-operation accord between Great Britain and France.

PRESIDENT DE VALERA LEAVES FOR LONDON TO TALK ABOUT ANNUITIES

DUBLIN, July 15.—President Eamonn de Valera left for London today to discuss with Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald differences which have arisen from the default of the Irish Free State on its payments of land annuities to the British government.

APPEAL BY CHURCHILL

Former Chancellor of Exchequer Urges English Speaking Peoples to Emulate Washington

LONDON, July 15.—Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, has broadcast an international appeal for English-speaking peoples to face the present economic crisis with the same candor which inspired George Washington at Valley Forge.

RELIEF IS DISCUSSED

Rotary Club Favors Loaning Gymnasium Money For Welfare Work

The Rotary Club, at its luncheon yesterday, expressed itself as being in favor of the principle of loaning money, now being held in trust fund for gymnasium purposes, to the city to be used in connection with relief of distress. The loaning of the money would be subject to adequate safeguard.

Other matters of club business were dealt with at the luncheon. President G. A. Woodland was in the chair and guests were J. H. McLeod of this city, M. S. Whittier of Juneau and Rev. Oswald Hodgson and A. Gonta of Telegraph Creek.

SALVAGE OF SUBMARINE

French Government Asks Assistance of British Expert in Raising Promethee

PARIS, July 15.—The French ministry of marine has requested E. S. Cox of the British salvaging firms which refloated Germany's warships scuttled and sunk at Scapa Flow following the Great War to assist in the work of refloating the submarine Promethee which sank last week near Cherbourg with over sixty men on board.

Call Was Issued Today For Economic Parley To be Held at Geneva

Follow Up of Lausanne at Which United States is Expected to Take Part and France, Britain and Italy Will Co-operate

GENEVA, July 15.—The council of the League of Nations, pursuant to an agreement reached at the Lausanne Conference, decided to issue a call for a world monetary and economic conference.

Britain and France have already announced that they will work together for the success of this conference and Italy has joined in the agreement which is looked upon as of utmost importance. United States will be represented and it is understood will take an important part in the proceedings.

LABORITE MEETING

Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council in Session—Labor Representative at Conference Suggested

The Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council, at a general meeting last night, endorsed a protest that has been made by the Winnipeg Trades & Labor Council at the failure of the Dominion government in selecting a representative of labor to take part in the forthcoming Imperial economic conference proceedings. It is pointed out by the Winnipeg council that the British government has sent three delegates representing labor in an advisory capacity to the conference.

The meeting discussed the local unemployment situation and reports from various committees were received. The project of setting up a welfare league in the city representative of various organizations was endorsed.

A good deal of correspondence was read at the meeting and routine business transacted. President S. D. Macdonald was in the chair and there was a good attendance of delegates.

FEW ARE FISHING

Some Men Out at Rivers Inlet Despite Strike—Conference Between Cannermen and Indian Fishermen

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police were advised today that a few fishermen are fishing in the Rivers Inlet area in spite of the general strike which is reported there.

There was to be a meeting yesterday of cannermen and representatives of Indian fishermen at Rivers Inlet but no word has been received as to the outcome of the meeting.

ELECTION POSSIBLE

Rumors at Victoria Indicate That Changes May Take Place There Soon

VICTORIA, July 15.—In spite of the assurances of Attorney General Pooley and other members of the government that no election is likely to be held in the near future, there is a general feeling here that important changes may take place soon. The report of the Kidd Commission is thought to contain drastic recommendations for financial rehabilitation with a general cutting down in the costs of government. This would probably commence with a reduction in the number of members of the cabinet and legislature.

It is said to have been urged in the report that administration be carried on by business people on strictly business lines and to give effect to this the present cabinet may be reorganized along non-party lines. T. D. Pattullo, leader of the Liberal party, is scarcely likely to join the new cabinet, if it should be formed, as he is known to be opposed to an administration by purely business interests as not being in sympathy with the needs and requirements of the majority of the people.

It is thought here that Premier Tolmie will be given a position under the Ottawa government and that some fairly outstanding Conservative will succeed him in office, possibly Leon Ladner or Hon. R. L. Maitland. There is also a possibility that Dr. Tolmie would recommend some person for the position who has not been in politics.

Princess Shot Man and Tried To Kill Herself

PARIS, July 15.—The Egyptian Princess Samyak Mansour, said to be a relative of King Fouad, shot and slightly wounded a real estate agent named Rene Leger and then tried unsuccessfully to commit suicide.

PEACE OVERTURES

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 15.—Peace overtures have been made to rebels holding the State of Sao Paulo and the provisional president ordered seven states to lay down arms.
