Why Not Local Firm  
To Build Wooden Ships.

There are plenty of contracts for wooden ships being offered by the Norwegian and French Governments. Also the French Government is open to purchase new ships when they are built. The Mullen Construction Company was offered six contracts for wooden ships, but refused them because it expected to go on with the steel vessels.

If, as seems possible, steel is not available for the work here, why should not a local company be formed to build wooden schooners for the French or Norwegian Governments. The facilities are here and the work could be carried on just as economically as in Victoria or Vancouver.

When it was necessary to get out spruce on the Queen Charlotte Islands, several local firms went into the business. Now there is a possibility that at any time the spruce production may stop, because the war may stop. Then the mills will need an outlet for their lumber. If ships were built here, that lumber could be used. It is possible too that a local firm could build and operate schooners from this port to carry the local lumber to the markets of the world.

Unionists Hid Their  
Light Under Bushel.

One of the questions often heard on Saturday was: "Where are the Unionists?" The ministers were invited by the Canadian Club and entertained by them at luncheon and in the evening they were the guests of the city, the Board of Trade and the Canadian Club, jointly. In these organizations there were some Unionists, but as an organization the committee or party or whatever they may be, did not appear, neither did the members to any extent do anything in the way of greeting the visitors.

They were Liberals who met the ministers, who worked on most of the committees, who made the arrangements, who decorated the theatre, and to a very large extent who formed the audience at the big meeting in the evening. It was also a Liberal who presided.

The News is not taking exception to the attitude of the Unionists, but simply mentions it because it seems to have been one of the subjects of general discussion throughout the city yesterday and Saturday night. As it was, the ministers got a good reception and they are well pleased with their visit. They carry away with them a good impression of the people, whom one of them describes as "the most persistent boosters he had met."

Judging from the tone of the addresses and the subject matter, the Liberals are pretty well dominating the present Government. Mr. Carvell is a man who stands out prominently in any organization and he measures up well alongside his colleagues. Some of the local Liberals have been rather doubtful of him since he joined the Borden Government, but it is just possible that it may turn out that the Bordenites joined the Carvell Government. At any rate it seems as if much good work has been done since they joined forces.

LAND REGISTRY ACT.  
(Sections 36 and 134.)

Re Application No. 9768-1 & 9771-1.  
TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman as owners in fee under two Tax Sale Deeds from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 21st day of November, 1917, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot eleven (11), Block twenty-five (25), Section seven (7), and Lot thirteen (13), Block thirty-five (35), Section eight (8), Map 923. You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by publication in the Daily News, and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:—  
"and in default of a caveat or certificate of his pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be forever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."

AND WHEREAS application has been made for a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the above-mentioned lands, in the name of Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman.

AND WHEREAS on investigating the title it appears that prior to the 12th day of October, 1916 (the date on which the said lands were sold for overdue taxes), you were the registered owner thereof.

FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that it the same time I shall effect registration in pursuance of such application and issue a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the said lands in the names of Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman unless you take and prosecute the proper proceedings to establish your claim, if any, to the said lands, or to prevent such proposed action on my part.
