### FOR SHIPBUILDING

Before leaving for Anyox Hon. B. Carvell wired to Hon. Mr. Ballantyne on Saturday and on his arrival last night neceived a reply to the effect that the position in regard to steel plates was unchanged, that the Government could not get enough for its own ships but that if the shipbuilding company could get an order from the United States Government permitting the export of the steel he would at once bring it before the Canadian Government for consideration.

"And they will grant it," said Mr. Carvell. "I do not expect the United States will allow the steel to be exported, however. They need all they can make in that country for their own work and the prospect for getting steel here does not look very encouraging."

"No, there would be no objection at all to your building wooden ships as long as you do not build them for Germany," he went on in reply to a question.

The minister admitted, however, that it was possible the Norwegian Government might have sufficient influence to get the steel for the ships to be built here.


#### In the War Garden?
