Geneva, Oct. 6.—Enver Pasha, Provisional President of Albania, and former commander in chief of the Turkish forces at Scutari, in an interview before his departure from Saloniki declared Turkey would hold out to the last minute before capitulating, in the belief that by doing so she would receive better terms from the Entente Allies. He expressed pleasure at the fate of Bulgaria, which, he said, had thrown in her lot with the Teutonic allies through covetous motives. He says Bulgaria is brutal and uncivilized.

SAVE MAKE CANADA SECURE

WHARF AT STEWART WILL BE BUILT IF BUSINESS WARRANTS

Mr. Carvell Said That All Wharves Were Being Taken Over By The Dominion Government.

Arrangements have been made by the Dominion Government to take over all the Provincial Government wharves in this province. That was the intimation given by Hon. F. B. Carvell at a meeting with the Board of Trade Saturday.

In reply to a plea for the reconstruction of the wharf at Stewart Mr. Carvell said that they would construct or keep up any wharves where it could be shown that business required them. If they could show that there was business at Stewart the wharf would be repaired at once. There had been an economic waste in having dual control by the Province and the Dominion. In the future they intended to build the wharves for business and not for politics.

One of the speakers pointed out to the minister that at Stewart there was 1,500 tons of ore on one dump awaiting shipment, but the wharf was not safe. It was in bad shape and was held together by a cable.

The minister again said that if they had evidence that there was business there, the work would be done. They must have evidence that it would be a business proposition.

MILITARY POLICE RAID STEAMSHIPS

The military police under Inspector Adams last night gathered in a number of the unregistered from the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince John. On the latter boat a number of men of foreign nationality who had just quit the spruce camps were arrested. One of these was an Austrian who had failed to register as an alien enemy and there was also a naturalized Canadian of German parentage who had failed to register for service. Eight were taken from the Prince Rupert and fourteen from the Prince John. They are being tried before Magistrate Carss this afternoon in the police court.

PEACE MOVE STARTED BY AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

Amsterdam, October 6—Austria-Hungary has been requested by Holland to invite the belligerents to take part in peace negotiations, says a Vienna correspondent of the Berlin Tageblatt. The correspondent adds that Holland has already sent out invitations. A delegation of Hungarian statesmen headed by Premier Wekerle has arrived in Vienna in connection with the new peace move.

CHANGE IN FISHING LICENSE SYSTEM

That the system of licensing is being dealt with thoroughly by the Department of Fisheries of the Dominion Government was stated by Hon. F. B. Carvell at a meeting with the Board of Trade Saturday afternoon. This in answer to a plea by G. W. Nickerson for a fairer distribution of the seining licenses.

Mr. Nickerson explained the manner in which all the licenses were held in this district and asked for a change. This he was assured would be made before the next season.
