Make Victory Loan a Success.

Citizens of Canada will now bend their energies toward making the Victory Loan a success.

When the dispatch came through that the Germans were suing for peace it was the general opinion that no consideration whatever should be given to the proposal. People who feel that way must pay the bills of keeping the army in the field. Practically everyone feels that the sacrifices have been so great that it would be wicked to give away the opportunity to settle the big fight right. The Germans are not yet ready for peace, no matter what their protestations may be. They are not yet in the mood to treat with the Allies in, what we should call, a reasonable manner. It must be "fight on" for some months to come. Another winter probably will have to be spent in the field. Many more victories must be won and many sacrifices made before the end. To do this much money will be required and the Canadian Government is now asking that this money be raised during one big campaign, which is to start at the end of this month and last for several weeks. That the response will be such as to do credit to the district is certain.

Red Cross Will Be Needed For Some Time.

As long as the war lasts and for a long time after the Red Cross must continue its work. It seems trite to mention any of the work that is done by this wonderful organization, so well is it known throughout the world. Here in Prince Rupert the people are doing their share and it is necessary to keep it up. There is a general meeting of the organization advertised for tonight and doubtless the attendance there will be such as to encourage the workers to continue their labors for the good cause. To keep up the enthusiasm year after year is difficult. Now that the end is in sight, however, it is no time to slacken. Let Prince Rupert do her bit in Red Cross work as in every other line of patriotic endeavor.

Better far that we all should perish than that such doctrines shall gain the ascendancy through the sacrifices we have made in our day and generation to suppress nations sated with lust for destruction of all we hold dear.

LAND REGISTRY ACT.
 (Sections 36 and 134.)

Re Application No. 9768-1 & 9771-1.

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman as owners in fee under two Tax Sale deeds from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 24th day of November, 1917, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot eleven (11), Block twenty-five (25), Section seven (7), and Lot thirteen (13) Block thirty-five (35), Section eight (8), Map 923. You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by publication in the Daily News, and your attention is called to section 26 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:—

"and in default of a caveat or certificate of its pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be forever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."

AND WHEREAS application has been made for a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the above-mentioned lands, in the name of Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman.

AND WHEREAS on investigating the title it appears that prior to the 12th day of October, 1916 (the date on which the said lands were sold for overdue taxes), you were the registered owner thereof.

FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that it the same time I shall effect registration in pursuance of such application and issue a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the said lands in the names of Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman unless you take and prosecute the proper proceedings to establish your claim, if any, to the said lands, or to prevent such proposed action on my part.

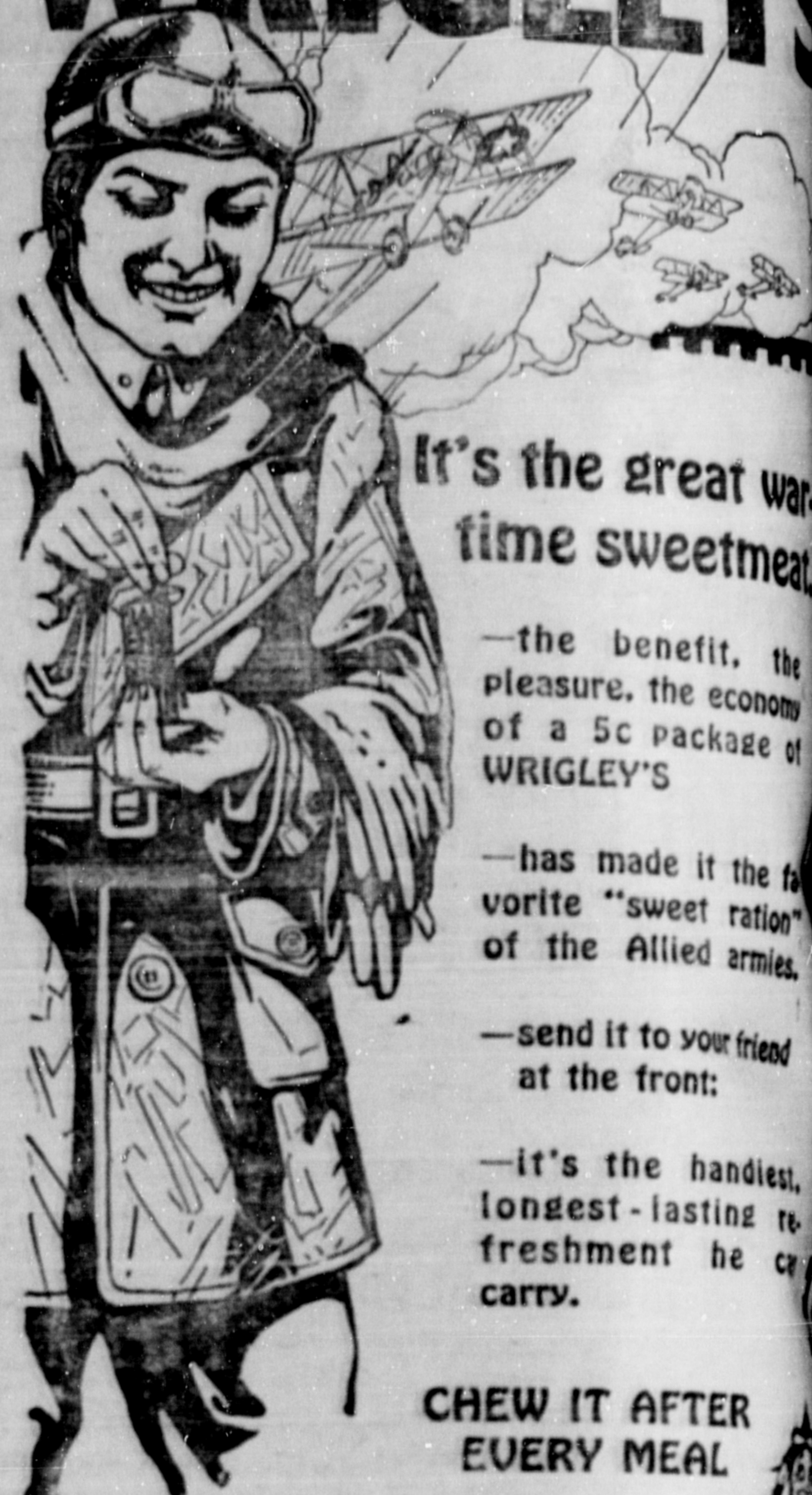
