PROSPECTOR AND DOGS TRAVELLED OVER 500 MILES

Tom Burns and Five Dogs Made Distance in 37 Days of Hiking

Bewhiskered and bedraggled after weeks of travel in the great silent wilderness of the sub-Arctic, Tom Burns, veteran prospector of three continents, blew into Dawson and is back to stay with the upper Yukon country, says the Dawson News. Burns traveled 560 miles over mountain, muskeg and tangled river bottoms and through dangerous streams in order to get back to Dawson. He came from Nenana, Alaska, the inland terminal of the new American government railway in Alaska.

Dogs Did Share.

The trip was made without a human companion, but with him Burns brought his five faithful companions of the trail, his native dog team. There being no snow in the northland during the summer season, the sleigh and the dog harness had to be left behind, but the dogs nevertheless did their share. They each carried as high as 20 pounds of supplies and never had less than five pounds of burden to the dog.

"I left Nenana with the dogs and myself in fine condition," says Burns, "and we came through without misfortune. We required 37 days of actual travel in covering the distance from Nenana to Dawson, but I rested a month on Cleary creek, near Fairbanks. After leaving Cleary it was one straight hike through the wilderness save for a few brief stops for prospecting. Whenever a stop was made the time was noted carefully in my diary, and deductions made, so have a careful compilation of our efforts as mushers. In stating that we were 37 days on the trip from Nenana I mean in actual traveling, not in lapsed time.

Slept in Open.

"Much of the way I slept out in the open without even a tent, and the dogs and I subsisted to a large extent off the rifle. I killed seven bears, two moose and six caribou and caught about one dozen fish on the trail. I had little time for fishing. That sort of provender was plentiful, but the other could be had much more quickly. We consumed practically all the big game killed. It was necessary to our existence. After killing an animal, we would consume what we could at that camping place and then I would take a part of the meat in my pack and distribute the rest among the packs on the dogs. The dogs had the minimum weight. When the meat was exhausted of five pounds to the pack. When meat was plentiful they had 15 pounds more each or a total of 20 pounds to the dog.

Proud of Dogs.

"I am proud of my dogs, and particularly of old Admiral Peary, a veteran of 12 winters, whom I have owned since he was born 12 years ago on Cleary creek. The dog since then has done many a long distance journey on the winter trails, and not a few in summer. I have kept a diary and have made an estimate of the distance he has travelled and I place it at the remarkable total of 22,250 miles. He is the greatest animal I ever drove and I have no doubt but what he soon will have run his mileage up to the distance equal to that around the world. He is a cross between a Nome malamute and a hickory brand of cheechaco conglomerate."
