CLOSING ALASKAN FISH STREAMS IS BEING DISCUSSED

In reply to the wire sent to the Hon. William C. Redfield, Secretary of Commerce, urging that hearings be held in Juneau and Ketchikan at which time any person interested might appear to show cause why the salmon streams of Southeastern Alaska should not be closed to fishing, Delegate Sulzer has received a telegram stating that the request would be complied with. The wire stated that the formal hearing will take place in Seattle on November 25th and that preliminary hearings will be held in Ketchikan and Juneau during the early part of November.

During the early spring many protests against cannery operations on the Yukon were sent to the Delegate from the people of interior Alaska. The matter was taken up with the Department and also with the Food Administration and others, but each Department insisted it had no authority to interfere. Finally the matter was put before Secretary Redfield in such a light that he agreed to the suggestion of holding the hearing in Seattle the latter part of November. People from interior Alaska are preparing to have representatives there to go into the Yukon river situation.

DAWSON

F. H. Devitt who has seen service in France, was a recent visitor to Dawson.

E. A. Wert, a well known business man of this city, has just returned after a long tour in the United States.

Jean Vanier, for seven years proprietor of the Jensen road-house, on Dominion Creek and for nine years a miner at Granville, is going out to visit his old home in Montreal.

Dr. Alfred Thompson, M. P., announces that he will ask the Dominion Parliament to remove the royalty on gold and to suspend the annual representation work required to hold claims, until after the war is over. This will require the amending of the Yukon Placer Act.

John Black has been appointed acting judge of the territorial court during the absence of Mr. Justice Macaulay, who has gone to Whitehorse to try several miners' lien cases.

R. A. Ringle, of Allgold, who is in the city says that a number of prospectors are busy on Allgold Creek, Lee Creek and other streams of the upper Klondike. Some fine potatoes were grown this year on Flat Creek by the Fooks brothers.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres, before receiving a Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 acre, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to value of \$200 per acre and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 2 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the allotment is made are protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

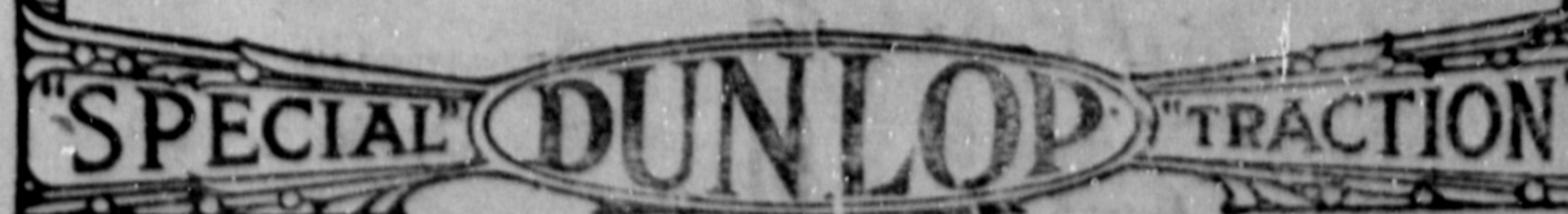
