Local News Notes

Good assortment of pipes at Gil's.

The Princess Sophia arrived in port today about 1 p.m. on her way north to Alaskan ports.

Mrs. L. W. Reilly returned to town this afternoon from Vancouver by the Princess Sophia.

T. H. Johnson of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., returned to the city last evening from Vancouver.

Frank Hicks, of Port Clements, arrived in the city yesterday by the Prince George from Vancouver. He is on his way back home.

F. S. Halliday was among the passengers returning to town yesterday from Vancouver, where he had been on a short business visit.

L. Mayne, engineer for the Marconi Company, arrived in town yesterday on his way across to Buckley Bay where he will erect a station.

Four Davis rafts arrived in port yesterday from the Queen Charlottes containing about 3,000,000 feet of spruce. This will be cut by the local mills.

C. E. Garrett of the Imperial Munitions Board arrived yesterday and is going to Moresby Island to take charge of the work of spruce production. His headquarters will be at Thurston Harbor.

Judge Young leaves this evening for Nanaimo to rejoin his family, and to say farewell to his son, Lieut. Alex Young, whose leave is up now. Alex has to report at Esquimalt next Tuesday for further service.

In connection with the sale of city lots yesterday the city treasurer states that the reason for the late commencement was the rush of people to pay their taxes at the last minute. They were anxious to allow tax payers every opportunity to redeem their lots without putting them to the extra expense which the sale would entail.

Harry Hanson has arrived back in the city after spending several months pursuing his profession in the Bella Coola region. While glad to get back to Prince Rupert he was sorry to leave Bella Coola, where he says they have had one of the most prosperous seasons on record. He brought up some of the apples they grow down there, just as samples, in which the merchants here might be interested.

Improvements are still being made at the spruce producing centres on the Islands. At Port Clements a fine new wharf is being erected to facilitate the handling of lumber. At Thurston Harbor probably the best equipped machine shop north of Vancouver has been erected and is now in use. It is able to do any repair work for the engines or other machines used in connection with spruce production on Moresby Island and thus save much valuable time.

MAJOR C. A. STAPLES
IS VISITING THE CITY

Major C. A. Staples, officer commanding the Army Medical Corps Training Depot with headquarters at Calgary, arrived from Victoria yesterday and will go east on the next train.

Major Staples lives at Stettler, Alta., but years ago he was well known on Vancouver Island where he was the company doctor for the Wellington Colliery Co. at Cumberland. He now practices at Stettler and is also interested in cattle ranching in that neighborhood. He says that they have a fine little town on the prairies and that all the citizens are persistent boosters, which keeps the place to the front and helps to make it more prosperous than it might otherwise be.

IS DISMISSED BY
MAGISTRATE AND
REARRESTED AT ONCE

Robert Griggs will Have to Serve
With His Majesty's Forces;
Being Sent South.

Among the cases to be brought before the magistrate on Tuesday morning as the result of the activities of the military police on the arrival of the two steamers on Sunday night, was that of Robert Griggs, who was charged with having no papers. The accused is an Englishman, aged 30 years, who had never reported under the Military Service Act. He was therefore classed as an absentee, or deserter under the Act. For the past two months he had been working as cook in the camps on the Islands. He claimed that previously he had been to sea and had been unaware of the necessity of registering. On being asked, he admitted that he knew here was a war on.

On the magistrate dismissing the charge laid against this man, Sub-Inspector Adams rearrested him right in court for not registering under the Military Service Act, and wired for instructions to headquarters. These have come, and the man has to be handed over to the first escort going south, to take up his duties with His Majesty's forces.

"A MODERN LORELEI"
AT THE WESTHOLME

The old story of the Rhine, before it was German, and of the Lorelei who inhabited its waters before the gutters of the outcasts of Europe were heard in the land, has been brought up to date and in the play to be screened at the Westholme Theatre this evening, the doings of the modern Lorelei will be depicted.
