Met President Kelley of the Grand
Trunk Pacific and Discussed
Shipbuilding.

D. C. McRae has returned from
a long visit in the east. He has
been away about two months,
during which time he was in Win-
nipeg, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal,
Minneapolis and Chicago. While
away he combined business with
pleasure, making purchases for
the business and visiting his old
home at Mooretown near Sarnia,
Ontario, which he had not seen
for 25 years.

While in Ottawa Alderman Mc-
Rae saw Thomas P. Kelley, Presi-
dent of the Grand Trunk Railway,
and discussed with him the pos-
sibilities of the shipbuilding here.
He found that Mr. Kelley had been
working on this matter for a long
time and was still keen on getting
work going here. He said that
should the present arrangements
not eventuate in the ships being
built, he will at once try to ar-
range for the yards to be used in
some other way.

The orchestral branch of the

fine progress. The orchestra is
a fourteen piece one, and judging

steamer Prince John has had to
go into drydock, her sailing to
northern Queen Charlottes on
October 16 has been cancelled and
also her sailing to the southern
islands October 19.

The fishing boat Haysport II. is

machinery. She has been carry-
ing dog salmon from the southern
islands to Port Edward's cannery.
The captain says that fish have
been plentiful at Jedway but
around Pacoff there have not been
as many as usual.

Sergeant J. H. Kelly of the Cana-
dian Engineers, has just been
promoted to be quartermaster
Sergeant in his company, accord-
ing to the latest advices from the
front. Sergeant Kelly is with the
tramway section of the engineers
and has done a lot of track laying
under fire since he went over.

the city. He is interested in cattle
ranching and is making inquiries

AMERICAN CONSUL

LEAVES NEXT WEEK

FOR IMPORTANT POST

Will Open New Consulate in Den-
mark and Will Winter at
Copenhagen.

George M. Hanson, consul for
the United States in Prince Ru-
pert, is leaving on Thursday next,
having been promoted to a posi-
tion of trust in Europe to which
he expects to go in the near fu-
ture.

Mr. Hanson is deputed to open
a new consulate at Aalborg, Den-
mark, and after a visit in Wash-
ington for further instructions
will proceed overseas and proba-
bly stay the winter at Copen-
hagen.

Mr. Hanson has been in Prince
Rupert over two years and during
his term here has lent dignity to
the office of the consulate and has
taken a keen interest in all that
pertained to the city. He has had
a busy time because a great many
American citizens have made
Prince Rupert and district their
headquarters for a good many
years past.

The promotion of Mr. Hanson
is one that will please the people
of this city, while at the same
time they regret to lose the Con-
sul. The fact that this consulate
is a stepping stone to an impor-
tant overseas position of trust is
one of which to be proud.

OFFICERS AND MEN

LOST ON DESTROYER

Washington, October 12.—In a
collision between a United States
destroyer and a British vessel on
October 9, two officers and eleven
enlisted men of the destroyer's
complement were lost, while thir-
teen other members of the crew
were injured. The collision oc-
curred in British waters and, ac-
cording to reports, was caused by
the jamming of the destroyer's
steering gear.

POLICE FORCES MUST

NOT JOIN UNIONS

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—Regulations
have been passed by the Dominion
Government under an order in
council preventing the Northwest
Mounted Police or the Dominion
police from joining labor unions.

RECOVERING BODIES

London, October 12.—The loss
of United States soldiers on the
Otranto numbered over 360. Up
to six o'clock Wednesday 175
bodies had been recovered from
the lost transport.
