English Interests Looking Into Possibility of Using This Port More Extensively

Looking over the Port of Prince Rupert for the purpose of investigating its possible use to a much greater extent than at present for other exports and imports besides wheat, representatives of one of the largest marketing organizations in the world were in the city today, arriving from the south on the Prince Robert and leaving this afternoon on the train. They were A. H. Hobley, T. Smailes and A. Pickup, directors of the Co-operative Wholesale Society of Manchester, England, the charterers of the grain ship Fresno City which left this port recently with a big cargo of wheat for United Kingdom points. They are touring Canada and conceived the idea that Prince Rupert might be used by them more extensively than at present for other shipments besides grain. Mr. Hobley is in charge of the grain department, Mr. Smailes of groceries and Mr. Pickup of textiles.

While in the city the party were the guests of the Alberta Wheat Pool, with whom they do business, and the Pool representative, L. H. Haworth with Mayor Orme, showed them around the city and gave them all available data in regard to its commercial facilities and possibilities.
