**HOSPITAL TROUBLES**

Matters of Administration Investigated by Board at Protracted Meeting Last Night.

There was a protracted session of the Hospital Board last evening, when certain matters of administration in connection with the staff were gone into. A petition from the probationer nurses had been sent direct to the board without passing as usual through the matron, and one nurse had been suspended for a month. Last evening the nurses were heard individually regarding their complaint, and the matron, too. Some of the nurses gave specific instances, and all testified to the general unpleasant atmosphere. Miss Carmichael, the matron, considered that the action of the probationer nurses in signing a petition was "unprofessional" and asked for their dismissal. After discussing the pros and cons, the board have postponed taking any action during the present epidemic.

**SERG. TOMMY BURNS AGAIN IN VANCOUVER**

Vancouver, October 15.—Serg. Tommy Burns, the only Canadian that ever held the world's heavyweight championship, has returned from Prince Rupert, where he opened a first-class cabaret about two weeks ago. Burns says Prince Rupert has a great future and will be a big city some day. Everyone treated him royally while there. He says there is only one knocker in Prince Rupert and that is a man who is in the same business who engineered a letter to the military officials here trying to make them believe he was not running a straight place. Tommy says any man who is that small and who goes out of his way to hurt him will never have any luck. Burns expects to be matched with Willie Meehan for six rounds and the proceeds to be given to the returned soldiers.

At the meeting of the City Council last night the sale of lots 9 and 10, Block 8, Section 2 to T. One of these is with the military forces and the other two engaged in war work. The solicitor advised that he did not think the case would come to trial, as the other side had no case. The judge had ordered the defendants to pay the cost of postponement.

**WILLIAM MARTIN IS  
SANITARY INSPECTOR**

Received Appointment Last Night  
With Two Aldermen Opposing  
—Said to Be Fearless.

At the meeting of the City Council last evening William Martin was appointed Sanitary Inspector in connection with his other duties. The move was recommended by the Works Committee and opposed by Aldermen Smith and Rochester, who favored making the engineer responsible and allowing Mr. Martin to work under him.

Alderman Casey, chairman of the Board of Works, explained that the real head of the department would be a doctor and if the inspector had to refer to the engineer and the engineer to the doctor there would be a double reference which would not make for efficiency.

Alderman McMeekin objected to further delay. Martin was a man who did not care a rap for anybody and that was the kind of man who was needed.

Alderman Smith while acknowledging that Mr. Martin had done good work during the past two weeks, was opposed to opening a new office.

Alderman Rochester said he thought it would be wise to put the offices under one head. The number of officials had been the talk of the town. There was not enough work for a man to do as sanitary inspector. There was no reason why one man should not do all the outside work.

The mayor explained that the inspector had a number of other duties to perform, some of which took him out at night.

**COUNCIL VOTES CASH  
FOR THE HOSPITAL**

The City Council decided last night on the advice of the Finance Committee to pay over to the Hospital Board the sum of \$5,000 at once. This amount had been promised if all the taxes came in, and provided the taxes were not all paid the amount the hospital was to get was to be in proportion to the amount collected. The tax collections have been less than seventy per cent. of the total amount but in view of the need of the hospital just now the full amount was paid.

Extra accommodation has to be found at once at the hospital for the patients who are coming in with influenza.

**THE POLICE COURT**

Two cases at the police court this morning had to be adjourned owing to the ravages of Spanish influenza, which prevented the necessary witnesses from appearing.

Judgment was given in the Chinese gambling case, which was dismissed. The magistrate considered that there was insufficient evidence to prove that the premises were being conducted as a gambling house, within the meaning of the law. It was not denied that the men were gambling, but there was nothing to prove that the house made any gain from the games. The money which was on the table when the raid took place will be returned.

J. E. Umbach, provincial surveyor-general, arrived in town today on his way up country. Mr. Umbach will visit the lakes district between the Bulkley and the Nechaco valleys, and also the areas under the new Land Settlement Board.
