> is an entirely voluntary proceeding, and returned men should know their own circumstances sufficiently to be able to judge as to whether this class of homesite situate upon the water and with boat service, is or is not suited to their particular circumstances. If any returned soldier has made a mistake in his selection through any misapprehension, he is at perfect liberty to withdraw.

Homes in Cities.

"What we are trying to do is to meet every phase of the land situation, for, we realize that not all will want the same kind of proposition. With this end in view we are trying to help out those who want to make homes for themselves in the cities and recently purchased some fifty lots in South Vancouver which had reverted to the municipality for taxes and which we purpose giving to returned men. These lots will make excellent homesites for men living in the municipalty engaged in occupation there, and have the advantage of streets, water, light, schools, etc., all ready.

"The foregoing is an indication of what we are doing. We believe that we are handling the situation on broad-guage lines. Beyond doubt the difficulties are many, but we are taking the situation as we find it, and while unravelling the tangle of errors of the past, are endeavoring to weave a durable garment for the future."
