The German Dude.

Perhaps it was some sudden reversal of positions which accounted for the capture of another prisoner, who is generally regarded as the most importantlooking visitor whom we have entertained as yet. He was a young eavalry officer in a sky blue coat with a red collar and the most beautiful leather, boots, just back from a leave which must have caused something of a flutter among the German women. Accompanied by a mounted servant who carried his kit, he made a superb entry into what he thought were the German lines and from there a less superb exit into what he discovered was the prisoners' cage. For hours afterwards he might have been seen, pacing up and down, too proud to speak even to his fellow German officers, and evidently waiting for Foch or Haig to apologize to him for the rude treatment he had suffered.


