Mrs. R. E. Allen and child re-
turned to the city this morning
by the Prince George after a visit
to Seattle and Vancouver.

Mrs. H. R. Grant and Miss Grant
were among the passengers on
the Prince George this morning
on her arrival from Vancouver.

Among the visitors to the city
from Alice Arm are Jas. McAleenan,
W. J. Crawford, G. W. Brugg,
V. E. Lad, and Robert Moore.

The funeral of the late Mrs.
Dyer took place this afternoon
from Haynor's funeral chapel.
Rev. W. S. A. Crux officiating.
Interment was at Fairview ceme-
tery.

Mrs. Spurr, who graduated as
a nurse in England, has gone to
Thurston Harbor to assist in tak-
ing care of the influenza patients
gathered there from the logging
camps.

The tug Commodore arrived in
port yesterday afternoon from the
Queen Charlotte Islands, bringing
the bodies of five loggers who fell
victims to the influenza epidemic.
None of them are local men.

There was snow on the hills
yesterday for the first time. That
is about the usual time. The
News' record shows that it has
varied from the 21st to 26th of
the month over a number of years.

Harry McLeod was among the
passengers returning to the city
last evening from up river, where
he has been spending a few days'
holiday. He was at the Prud-
homme ranch near Telkwa and
has come back with the tan of the
outdoor life, and feeling fit.

The doctors in town are very
much overworked and it must not
be expected that they can answer
every call promptly. An effort is
being made to attend the worst
cases and others have to await
their turn. The medical men are
trying to look after all regardless
of their ability to pay or other-
wise, and the fact that a man has
money does not entitle him to
preference.

When the "Northern Cross"
visited Kitkatla last week, Rev.
Rural Dean Rushbrook found that
several of the Indians were down
with influenza and one or two had
already died. He has therefore
decided to cancel his trip north
to Alice Arm and return to Kit-
katla with medicine, and help
minister to the natives there who
are without either doctor or nurse.
Kitkatla is an Indian village on
Dauphin Island about forty miles
south from here.

The funeral took place this
morning from the chapel of the
B. C. Undertakers of several In-
dians, victims of the epidemic of
Spanish influenza. The Rev. W.
S. A. Crux conducted the service.
Many friends of the deceased con-
gregated at the chapel this morn-
ing to attend the service, and
burial took place at Fairview. The
deceased were Chief Swanson and
his wife of Port Simpson, Samson
McDonald of Kitimaat, Baby Ryan
and Mrs. Carrie Mahony.

In the Letter Box

Wants Whisky.

To the Editor:—

At the present moment the laity,
and we think some at least of the
medical profession, is recom-
mending the free use of alcoholic
stimulants for the amelioration,
if not the cure, of the influenza.

We may think that the victim of
the flu is mistaken in thinking
that a bottle of good liquor would
cure him. But the Creator has
given to each of us the care of his
own body, and if a man's mind
directs that he use whisky for the
cure of its ills, are we, the balance
of the community, so cock sure
that he is going to poison himself
that we are justified in forcing
him to resort to illegal methods
to get the whisky that he thinks
he needs? And poor stuff is
readily obtainable at \$16 per
bottle if one knows where to look.

The provision in the present
prohibition law that alcoholic
liquors may be obtained on a
doctor's prescription is inad-
equate, because the doctors have
neither the time nor the inclina-
tion to write prescriptions for
everyone who thinks he needs
them, in this emergency.

To my mind it seems plain that
the Government should take im-
mediate steps to make it possible
for a man to get a bottle of good
liquor at a reasonable price with-
out any red tape whatever.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed
lands only.

Records will be granted covering only
land suitable for agriculture purposes
and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished,
but parties of not more than four may
arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with
joint residence, but each making nec-
essary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for
five years and make improvements to
value of \$10 per acre, including clearing
and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-
fore receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not
less than 5 years, and has made prop-
rietary improvements, he may, in case
of ill-health or other cause, be granted
intermediate certificate of improvement
and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence
may be issued provided applicant makes
improvements to extent of \$300 per an-
num and records same each year. Fail-
ure to make improvements or record
same will operate as forfeiture. Title
cannot be obtained on these claims in
less than 5 years, with improvements of
\$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared
and cultivated, and residence of at
least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may
record another pre-emption, if he re-
quires land in conjunction with his
farm, without actual occupation, pro-
vided statutory improvements made and
residence maintained on Crown granted
land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
acres, may be leased as homesteads;
title to be obtained after fulfilling res-
idential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes,
areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased
by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of the Act is enlarged to
include all persons joining and serving
with His Majesty's Forces. The time
within which the heirs or devisees of a
deceased pre-emptor may apply for
title under this Act is extended from
one year from the death of such person,
as formerly, until one year after the
conclusion of the present war. This
privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to
persons holding uncompleted Agree-
ments to Purchase from the Crown of
such proportion of the land, if divisible,
as the payments already made will
cover in proportion to the sale price of
the whole parcel. Two or more persons
holding such Agreements may group
their interests and apply for a prop-
ortionate allotment jointly. If it is not
considered advisable to divide the land
covered by an application for a prop-
ortionate allotment, an allotment of land
of equal value selected from available
Crown lands in the locality may be
made. These allotments are conditional
upon payment of all taxes due to the
Crown or to any municipality. The
rights of persons to whom the pur-
chaser from the Crown has agreed to
sell are also protected. The decision of
the Minister of Lands in respect to the
adjustment of a proportionate allotment
is final. The time for making applica-
tion for these allotments is limited to
the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applica-
tion made after this date will not be
considered. These allotments apply to
town lots and lands of the Crown sold
at public auction.

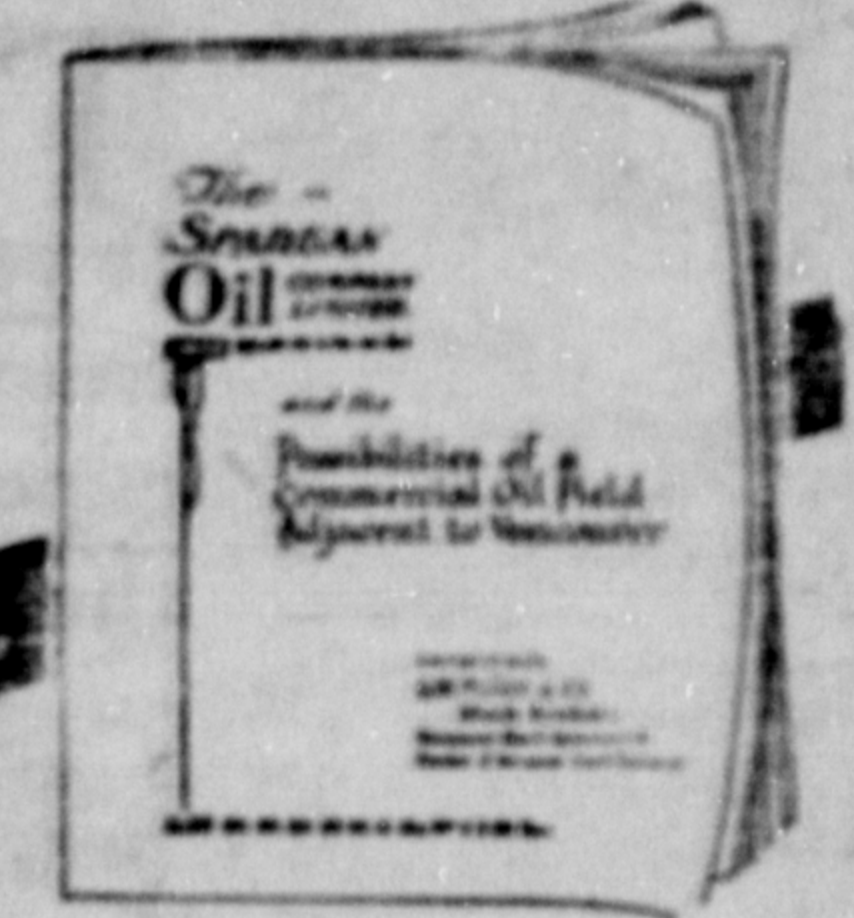
