ARRIVES HOME WITH ONLY ONE LEG AFTER SEVERAL BIG BATTLES

Sergt. J. Jardine of Prince George Taking Orders for Souvenir Book in Interests of Club.

To raise money for the members of the Amputation Club of British Columbia is the errand of Sergt. J. Jardine of Prince George, who is in the city taking orders for "Gold Stripe," a Christmas souvenir which is being published in the interests of the Club.

Sergt. Jardine comes here direct from Shaughnessy Hospital at Vancouver where he has been convalescing until such time as he gets his new leg. The original leg was left in England as a result of a wound from an explosive bullet during the big charge at Vimy Ridge. Every effort was made to save the leg, but it was found impossible to do so. Considerable time was spent in hospital at King's College, London, and at Buxton and Liverpool.

Sgt. Jardine left Prince George in July, 1915, and went overseas with the 54th Kootenay Battalion and was with them at Ypres Salient when the Canadians saved the day for the whole British army. He also took part in the fighting down the Somme before being put out by the barbarous explosive bullet of the Hun.

Sgt. Jardine left Prince George a private and he was given his stripes after the action on the Somme. He expects to do a good business in taking orders for and selling advertising in the book which his club is bringing out. All the proceeds go to the men who have lost their limbs and for that reason its appeal should be strong to everyone.

FEWER PINK SALMON ON ACCOUNT OF FLU

As a result of the influenza epidemic prostrating the entire force of the Seton Lake hatchery, thirteen million pink salmon eggs, supplied to the Dominion hatchery service by the provincial government for the purpose of experimenting in the propagation of this species have had to be planted in Cayoose creek while still in the "eyed" stage. Chief Inspector F. H. Cunningham has so advised Hon. William Sloan, provincial commissioner of fisheries. As a result, it is unlikely that nearly so many of them will survive as would have been the case had there been a supply of trained operatives which would have permitted the original plan to be carried out.

POLITICAL CAMPAIGN IN THE UNITED STATES

Control of Congress Depends Upon Elections to Be Held There Next Month.

Washington, October 31.—The great biennial "drive" in American politics—the Congressional elections—is on.

September marked the close of state primary elections and nominating conventions, leaving their train of "lame ducks" and other political cripples. Leaders of all parties now are in the midst of the campaign which precedes election day in November.

The lines of battle are fairly well defined. Upon the results of the balloting depends political control of the Sixty-sixth Congress, which convenes in December, 1919, unless sooner summoned by President Wilson. Dependent upon the returns are the fates of aspirants for nearly two-score seats in the Senate and 435 in the House.

Like the Presidential election of 1916, when California's votes, after a week's wait, determined finally the nation's President, the Congressional result, according to private statements of prominent Republicans and Democrats in Washington, is expected to be close. The Democrats now have fifty-two Senators against forty-four Republicans, while in the House the respective strength is 216 and 209. Seats of all of the latter are involved in the present campaign, while twenty-one Democratic and fifteen Republican Senate seats are at stake.

Election Over in Several States.

For all practical purposes the election is over in a number of states—in the "solid South," where nomination on the Democratic ticket is equivalent to election. Primaries and conventions in these states, however, although changing present personnel in Senate and House from several states, have not affected the final result. For some Republicans, without opposition, the primaries also have meant certain election in November; these also do not change present line-ups in Congress, incumbents being named for re-election.

Socialist, Prohibition and other parties also have their candidates in the present campaign. Coalition of Democratic and Republican forces against the Socialists has occurred in some localities, but the campaign now is being conducted largely between the two leading parties in an effort to secure unquestioned control of the Senate and House without intervention of any "balance of power" from the minor organizations.

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
